## 1 Purpose

This procedure was developed in consultation with the Office of V.P. Indigenous to provide a process for members of the UM community to coordinate and/or perform smudging and pipe ceremony at the University of Manitoba campuses and remote facilities. This process is in place to ensure smudges, pipe ceremonies and building occupants activities are not disrupted by life safety system alarms or ventilation issues.

Under the Province of Manitoba’s “The Non-Smokers Health Protection Act,” smudging and the use of tobacco in pipe ceremonies are permitted. The University of Manitoba recognizes that smudging and pipe ceremonies are a part of the Indigenous traditional way of life and are therefore permitted and supported on campus.

This procedure is intended to outline the process of organizing a smudge in a UM location from a technical and life safety perspective and is not intended to act as a guide for the smudging ceremony itself. ## 2 Scope

This procedure applies to all members of the UM community.

## 3 Definitions

### **Smudge and Pipe Ceremony**

Smudging is an Indigenous tradition which involves the burning of sweetgrass, sage, and cedar. Sage and cedar smudges produce a very strong and distinct aroma but the smoke associated with them is minimal and lasts a very short time. Sweetgrass has a very mild aroma and produces less smoke. A smudge is burned primarily for purification and to help to create a positive mind set. Tobacco is used in pipe ceremonies by a pipe carrier.



## 4 Responsibilities

It is the responsibility of the leadership of the UM as well as all staff, students, faculty, and guests to learn about the cultural importance of smudging and pipe ceremony.

It is the responsibility of the **Event Organizer** to:

- Ensure that cultural protocols are followed. (<https://umanitoba.ca/indigenous/culture-and-protocol>).
- Read, understand, and comply with this procedure and any applicable procedures under section 5.

It is the responsibility of **Physical Plant** to:

- Provide technical support for smudging and pipe ceremonies.

It is the responsibility of the **Environmental Health and Safety Office** to:

- Support and offer safety training when required for event organizers planning a smudge/pipe ceremony.
- Review and maintain this technical document.

## 5 Procedures

### 5.1 Preparation

Event organizers must ensure that cultural protocols are followed. The UM Indigenous community offers many resources and opportunities for education. More information about Culture and Protocol can be found on the UM Indigenous website <https://umanitoba.ca/indigenous/culture-and-protocol>.

Smudge-friendly locations can be used for smudging at any time without notification to Physical Plant. These locations have been previously reviewed and do not require the isolation of life safety systems.

Smudging locations requiring protocols are locations that have been previously reviewed and may require Physical Plant to isolate life safety systems. There are also other spaces you wish to participate in smudging that are not on the list. For these locations, please complete the Smudging Location Review Form and send to the [Life Safety Engineer](#) and [EHSO](#) 3 working days prior to the event so ensure any required protocols can be implemented.

The area will be reviewed for any protocols that may be needed in order to ensure fire alarm and ventilation issues will not disrupt the ceremony participants' or building occupants' activities. The person who completed the review form will be contacted by Physical Plant or EHSO to ensure all safety protocols can be followed and will provide any other assistance needed.

## 5.2 During the Ceremony

A notification sign must be posted on the door of the room where the smudging will take place. Please refer to the poster provided below in this document which can be printed and utilized. During the smudge, ensure the door remains closed and any location specific procedures are followed. Be aware of the location of any nearby combustible materials and know the location of the nearest fire extinguisher.

## 5.3 Post Ceremony

Once the aroma of the smudge/tobacco has dissipated, the sign shall be removed. Keep embers in a heat proof container until cold to the touch before discarding.
