Objectives:

1. Content: World history is the study of the interactions between various peoples in the global past. The course begins in 1800 when perhaps the most important transformation in the history of humankind, the Industrial Revolution, was taking place. In this course, we will focus upon the impact of industrialization on human societies including its role in Imperialism, technological, ecological and cultural change, development of political philosophies and total warfare. Specific themes to be covered include: The 19th Century peak of European colonialism, the rise of socialism and fascism, the two World Wars, de-colonization and national liberation movements, and the rise of American empire.
2. Skills: In studying world history since 1800 we will develop certain skills that have relevance beyond historical study. These include critical evaluation of secondary sources, understanding primary sources by placing them into their proper context, writing essays, and contributing to group discussions.

Assignments:

Research Essay = 30% (Due May 18)

Primary Source Analysis Essay = 25% (Due May 25)

Mid Term Exam = 15% (May 16)

Final Exam = 30% (June 1 9:00 am)

The Primary Source Analysis Essay: You will be required to write a 6-8 page (1500-2000 word) essay on one of three possible topics. For each topic you will have to answer a specific question based upon a collection of primary sources (a guide to the assignment which includes required readings is available electronically through UM Learn).
