Detailed Course Description

Studies in *Physical Geography* are focused upon the thin surface layer of the Earth where land, air and water meet. The topics included in this introductory course appear as parts of many disciplines such as: Geology, Meteorology, Climatology, Biology, and Oceanography; but the basic concern of those who study *Physical Geography* is to investigate the ways in which phenomena associated with these various disciplines interact with one another. Humans are becoming increasingly aware of the significance of changes that occur in the physical environment. We are at last beginning to realize that we too have an impact upon the environment, and that the consequences of our actions may have a positive or a negative effect.

Course Goals

- 1. To understand the methods used to examine the Earth, their development and that of the geographic discipline.
- 2. To introduce the various geographic disciplines.
- 3. To describe and explain the Earth's atmosphere, oceans, land surface and biosphere, and relate them to the dominant natural processes and to changes over time.
- 4. To develop an appreciation of the complex inter-relationships inherent in Earth's natural systems.

Method of Evaluation

Students will be evaluated via two (2) in-class midterm tests worth 50% in total (2 x 25%), four (4) online quizzes using the Sapling Online resource worth 10% (4 * 2.5%), and one (1) final exam worth 40%.

Midterm Test I (Part A): Oct. 2; 50 minutes (<u>25</u>% of course value)

Midterm Test II (Part B - cumulative): Nov 1; 50 minutes (25% of course value)

On-Line Quizzes (Sapling): Sept. 20, Oct 18, Nov. 22, Dec. 6 (10% of course value)

Final Exam (Part C - cumulative): TBA (schedule by the registrar's office); (2 hours, 40% of course value)

Midterm Test Information

 textbook questions in brackets at the end of the question "(Textbook Question)"
- Students who miss a midterm test due to a documented medical or personal emergency will be **not** be offered a "makeup" test. **See Policy Regarding Missed Midterm Tests.**

Midterm Test Review:

- Test questions will **NOT** be returned or posted on *UM Learn*.
- Tests will be reviewed during lecture as soon as possible (usually within two (2) days). While reviewing tests, students are permitted to make *handwritten notes only*.

 grade of zero (0) being assigned for the missed midterm test.
- For example, if a student misses 1 midterm and provides documentation within 48 hours, the final exam will be reweighted to 65% instead of the original 40% (40% + 25% = 65%).
- Medical/professional documentation MUST be legible and state that you were UNABLE to write
 the midterm test due to a medical circumstance on the day of the midterm test or exam. A note
 that you "saw a doctor" is NOT considered medical documentation.
- Please note that reasonable reasons for missing a test or exam do NOT include: vacations, long weekends away, other course work, other tests or quizzes on the same day etc..
- If in doubt about what is an appropriate reason for missing a midterm test or exam, please ask
 the instructor prior to the test or due date via email. If you have not received a response from the

- Students who are unable to write an examination due to an unexpected illness must file an application for a deferred examination with their home faculty, setting out the reasons for the deferral. The application must normally be filed within <u>forty-eight (48)</u> hours of the scheduled date of the missed examination or, in a case where more than one examination was missed, within <u>forty-eight (48)</u> hours of the scheduled date of the last examination missed. The application must be accompanied by a medical certificate or otherwise appropriate documentation certifying the reason for the deferral, the inability of the student to write the examination at the regular scheduled time and, where possible, an indication of the period of incapacity. Based on the evidence, the Dean or Director shall decide whether the application is approved. Based on the student's ongoing incapacity or other exceptional circumstances a deferral may be granted to a student who files an application after the **forty-eight (48)** hour period has lapsed.
- The Department of Environment and Geography schedules deferred exams for this course once the required paper work has been received from the student's html

- Deferred examinations will normally take place within 30 working days from the end of the

- Students must bring student ID or photo identification to the deferred exam.

iClicker Participation Bonus

- This class will use iClicker Reef to conduct polls and quizzes in class. These are optional for students to answer.

You may also meet one-on-one with a writing tutor who can give you feedback at any stage of the writing process, whether you are just beginning to work on a written assignment or already have a draft. Writing tutors can also give you feedback if you submit a draft of your paper online. (Please note that the online tutors require 48 hours, from Mondays to Fridays, to return your paper with comments.)
