#### **Course description:**

(Formerly 053.245) Traces the evolution of the cultural landscape of Western Canada including Indian occupancy, environmental perception, urban and rural landscapes, and regional images in art and literature. Prerequisite: a grade of "C" or better in a minimum of three credit hours from Geography courses numbered at the 1000 level, or permission of department head.

#### **Course objectives:**

This course is intended to introduce the student to various geographical themes, concepts and processes within the context of the natural and anthropogenic development of the Canadian Prairie region. The course will trace the evolution of the prairie landscape from its natural origins through aboriginal occupation and European agricultural and urban settlement to its present form.

# **Method of Evaluation**

Students will be evaluated via two (2) in-class tests worth 30% in total (2 x 15%), six (6) assignments worth 65% and class attendance worth 5%.

Once a test is started, regardless of the outcome, students will not be offered a makeup test.

#### **Test Review:**

- Test questions will NOT be returned or posted on UM Learn.
- Tests will be reviewed during lecture as soon as possible (usually within seven (7) days). While reviewing tests, students are permitted to make *handwritten notes only*. Laptops or any device capable of capturing images or sound are not permitted.
- Students are permitted to review their midterm test within seven (7) days of the in-class review. An appointment must be made via *email*.

#### **Assignments:**

- Assignments are due by 4:30 PM on the due date as a hard copy and digital copy (submitted online through *UM Learn*). A hard copy and digital must both be submitted. Failure to result will result in marks being deducted for the assignment. Only the hard copy will be graded.
- Extensions without penalty may be granted for compassionate or medical reasons. Documentation to support your request may include a medical certificate. Your medical documentation MUST be legible and state that you were UNABLE to submit your assignment due to a medical circumstance. A note that you "saw a doctor" is NOT considered medical documentation.
- Please note that computer problems are not an acceptable excuse for late assignments.
- Ten percent (10%) a day will be deducted for late assignments, including weekends commencing as soon as the submission deadline has lapsed.
- For example: If a paper is due January 30, it must be submitted at 4:30 PM. If it is submitted after this time (i.e. 4:31 PM), the assignment is late, and 10% will be deducted from the total value of the paper (i.e. 10% from a paper graded out of 100 = 10 marks). A further ten percent (10%) per day (including weekends) will be deducted for each subsequent day the assignment is late
- All assignment must be submitted/completed to pass the course.
