Report of the Executive Committee of the Faculty of Graduate Studies on Course and Curriculum Changes

I am writing to report corrections to course introduction proposals for the Department of Preventive Dental Science (Faculty of Dentistry), the Department of Biological Sciences (Faculty of Science), and the Faculty of Pharmacy which were approved by Senate at its meeting on November 7, 2012.

Observations:

1. Department of Preventive Dental Science

The error concerns course PDSD 7109 Pharmacology and Toxicology in Pediatric Dentistry (3). It was recently brought to our attention that courses that end in an odd number are being reserved for courses taught in French. Accordingly, I am requesting that Senate approve PDSD 7110 as the new course number for Pharmacology and Toxicology in Pediatric Dentistry.

2. Department of Biological Sciences

The error concerns courses **BIOL 7553 Molecular Biology of Eukaryotes (DNA) (3)** and **BIOL 7554 Molecular Biology of Eukaryotes (RNA) (3).** It was recently brought to our attention that courses that end in an odd number are being reserved for courses taught in French. Accordingly, I am requesting that Senate approve **BIOL 7554 as the new course number for Molecular Biology of Eukaryotes (DNA)** and **BIOL 7556 as the new course number for Molecular Biology of Eukaryotes (RNA)**.

3. <u>Faculty of Pharmacy</u>

The error concerns course **PHRM 7100 Pharmacoepidemiology** (3). It was recently discovered that the course number proposed has already been used. Accordingly, I am requesting that Senate approve **PHRM 7102 as the new course number for Pharmacoepidemiology.**

Report of the Executive Committee of the Faculty of Graduate Studies on Course and Curriculum Changes

Preamble

- 1. The Faculty of Graduate Studies has responsibility for all matters relating to the submission of graduate course, curriculum and program changes. Recommendations for new programs or changes are submitted by the Faculty Council of Graduate Studies for the approval of Senate.
- 2. In October 2007, the Faculty of Graduate Studies approved a process of *Streamlining Course Introductions, Modifications, & Deletions* which allows the Executive Committee to approve these changes in lieu of Faculty Council when the courses are not associated with a new program or program changes.
- 3. The Faculty of Graduate Studies Executive Committee met on December 17th to consider course change proposals from the Dept. of Physiology, Faculty of Medicine.

Observations

1. The Dept. of Physiology proposes the deletion of one course, PHGY 7240 Medical Physiology (6) and the introduction of two courses, PHGY 7242 Medical Physiology Part A (3) and PHGY 7244 Medical Physiology Part B (3) to divide the course into two separate courses which is in part a response to Physiology's recent graduate program review to address time to completion. A student admitted in January will be able to take Part A at the time of first registration, rather than wait until the following September. Moreover, breaking the course up into 3 credit hours makes it a more desirable elective for students from outside the department.

Dept. of Physiology

Course Deletion

PHGY 7240 Medical Physiology

Course Introductions

PHGY 7242 Medical Physiology Part A

Lecture, seminar, tutorial and/or demonstration course dealing with fundamental biophysical processes, and function of major respiratory and cardiovascular organ systems (including membrane transport and muscle contraction in respiratory and cardiovascular physiology). Pathophysiological structures and function, and their relation to disease will be introduced as appropriate.

PHGY 7244 Medical Physiology Part B

Lecture, seminar, tutorial and/or demonstration course dealing with fundamental biophysical processes, and function of major organ systems (including related to renal

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and gastrointestinal physiology, endocrinology and neurophysiology). Pathophysiological structures and function, and their relation to disease will be introduced as appropriate.

1. NEW OFFERS

Donald and Shirley McQueen Bursary

In memory of Don McQueen (C.A./55), his wife Shirley McQueen has established an endowment fund at the University of Manitoba with a gift of \$28,258.04 in 2011. The Manitoba Scholarship and Bursary Initiative has made a contribution to the fund. The fund will be used to provide bursaries for students enrolled in the I.H. Asper School of Business. The available annual income from the fund will be used to offer one bursary to an undergraduate student who:

- (1) is enrolled full-time in the I.H. Asper School of Business at the University of Manitoba, in any year of the Bachelor of Commerce program;
- (2) has achieved a minimum degree grade point average of 2.0;
- (3) has demonstrated financial need on the standard University of Manitoba bursary application form.

The selection committee will be named by the Dean of the I.H. Asper School of Business.

The Board of Governors of the University of Manitoba has the right to modify the terms of this award if, because of changed conditions, it becomes necessary to do so. Such modification shall conform as closely as possible to the expressed intention of the donor in establishing the award.

Florence and Robert Brownridge Bursary

In 2012, Florence Brownridge, (B.A. 49/, B.SW/51) established an endowment fund with a gift of \$25,000 at the University of Manitoba. The purpose of the fund is to provide financial support to undergraduate students in the Faculty of Social Work. Each year, the available annual interest will be offered to an undergraduate student who:

- (1) is enrolled full-time in either the third or fourth year of study in the Faculty of Social Work at the University of Manitoba;
- (2) has achieved a minimum degree grade point average of 2.5;
- (3) has demonstrated financial need on the standard University of Manitoba bursary application form.

The selection committee shall be named by the Dean of the Faculty of Social Work (or designate).

The Board of Governors of the University of Manitoba has the right to modify the terms of this award if, because of changed conditions, it becomes necessary to do so. Such modification shall conform as closely as possible to the expressed intention of the donor in establishing the award.

North American Caribou Workshop Graduate Fellowship in Wildlife Management

The North American Caribou Workshop and the Clayton H. Riddell Faculty of Environment, Earth, and Resources have established an endowment fund valued at \$30,000 in 2012. The purpose of the fellowship is to support students at the University of Manitoba pursuing graduate studies in wildlife management with a particular emphasis on the management of caribou and northern ecosystems. Beginning in 2014-2015, the available annual income from the fund will be used to offer one fellowship to a graduate student each October who:

(1) is enrolled full-time in the Faculty of Graduate Studies at the University of Manitoba in a Master's or Doctoral program delivered by the Clayton H. Riddell Faculty of Environment, Earth,

and Resources, including the Natural Resources Institute;

- (2) has achieved a minimum degree grade point average of 3.5;
- (3) demonstrates an interest in aspects of caribou research, monitoring or management and who considers different disciplines or sub-disciplines such as ecology, economy, governance, resource management and land use planning.

Students applying for the fellowship will be required to complete an application including (a) a short essay (500 words maximum) explaining how different disciplines contribute to caribou research, monitoring or management as well as listing any relevant project(s) and/or experience in wildlife management in Manitoba and Canada; (b) an official transcript(s); (c) two letters of recommendation.

No award will be made if, in a given year, the selection committee cannot identify a candidate of sufficient merit.

The Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies (or designate) will ask the Dean of the Clayton H. Riddell Faculty of Environment, Earth, and Resources (or designate) to name the selection committee for this award.

Olga Anderson Bursaries

Mrs. Olga Anderson has bequeathed \$2,000 to the University of Manitoba in 2012. The purpose of the gift will be to provide financial support to students in the Department of Human Nutritional Sciences. This gift will be used to offer two bursaries, valued at \$1,000 each, in 2012-2013 only. The bursaries will be offered to undergraduate students who:

- (1) are enrolled full-time in any year of study in the Department of Human Nutritional Sciences at the University of Manitoba;
- (2) have achieved a minimum degree grade point average of 2.5;
- (3) have demonstrated financial need on the standard University of Manitoba bursary application form.

The selection committee will be named by the Head of the Department of Human Nutritional Sciences (or designate).

Ratuski Memorial Bursary

In 2012, the Ratuski Family established an endowment fund with an initial value of \$10,000, in memory of their parents Anne and Peter Ratuski, as well as their siblings Gregory Ratuski (LL.B/56) and William Ratuski (C.A./62). The Manitoba Scholarship and Bursary Initiative has made a contribution to the fund. In keeping with the family's heritage and cultural background, the bursary will be awarded to an undergraduate student enrolled in the Faculty of Arts and majoring in Slavic Studies. Each year, the available annual interest will be awarded to an undergraduate student who:

- (1) is enrolled full-time majoring in Slavic Studies in the Faculty of Arts (may include coursework in Ukrainian language, Ukrainian literature and/or Ukrainian cultural studies);
- (2) has a minimum degree grade point average of 2.0;
- (3) demonstrates financial need on the standard University of Manitoba bursary application form.

The selection committee will be named by the Department Head (or designate) of the Department of Slavic Studies in the Faculty of Arts

The Board of Governors of the University of Manitoba has the right to modify the terms of this award if, because of changed conditions, it becomes necessary to do so. Such modification shall conform as closely as possible to the expressed intention of the donor in establishing the award.

Wilding-McLean Entrance Scholarship in Arts

In celebration of the 70th anniversary of her graduation from the University of Manitoba in 1942, Marjory McLean has established an endowment fund with an initial gift of \$42,000. The fund will be used to provide an entrance scholarship for high-achieving students entering their first year in the Faculty of Arts under the Direct Entry Program Option. Each year, the available annual interest from the fund will be used to offer one scholarship to an undergraduate student who:

- (1) has graduated from a high school in the province of Manitoba;
- (2) is admitted to the University of Manitoba under the Direct Entry Program Option to the Faculty of Arts with a minimum average of 85% on those courses considered for admission to the University of Manitoba;
- (3) is enrolled as a full-time (minimum 80% course load) undergraduate student in the year in which the scholarship is tenable;
- (4) is registered for a 1000 level course in English Literature in the Department of English, Film, and Theatre.

Preference will be given to students from rural Manitoba.

The Dean of the Faculty of Arts (or designate) will name the selection committee for this award.

The Board of Governors of the University of Manitoba has the right to modify the terms of this award if, because of changed conditions, it becomes necessary to do so. Such modifications shall conform as closely as possible to the expressed intention of the donor in establishing the award.

Youth Mentorship Bursary

A trust fund has been established at the University of Manitoba in 2012. The purpose of the fund is to support access to post-secondary education for youth from disadvantaged social and/or economic backgrounds. The fund will be used to offer entrance bursaries for students who have participated in the Let's Talk Science Youth Mentorship Program offered through the Faculty of Science at the University of Manitoba and subsequently enter post-secondary study at the University of Manitoba. Each year, the interest and the accumulated revenue of the fund will be used to offer one or more bursaries, valued at \$500 each, to undergraduate students who:

- (1) have participated in the Let's Talk Science Mentorship Program at the University of Manitoba through a Manitoba High School;
- (2) have qualified for admission and subsequently are enrolled full-time (minimum 18 credit hours) in any faculty or school at the University of Manitoba;
- (3) have demonstrated financial need based on the standard University of Manitoba bursary application form.

The Let's Talk Science Coordinators in the Faculty of Science will provide a complete listing of the previous years' Let's Talk Science participants to the Awards Selection Coordinator by no later than October 1 every year.

The selection committee will be named by the Director, Financial Aid and Awards (or designate).

The Board of Governors of the University of Manitoba has the right to modify the terms of this award if, because of changed conditions, it becomes necessary to do so. Such modification shall conform as closely as possible to the expressed intention of the donor in establishing the award.

Student Accessibility Services

2011-2012 Annual Report

Mission

The mission of Student Accessibility Services is to collaborate with the University of Manitoba to ensure equal access for students with disabilities by:

- providing supports and programs that recognize our diverse student environment;
- promoting partnerships between students, faculty and staff; and
- educating the university community about accessibility.

SAS provides support and advocacy for students with disabilities such as: hearing, injuryrelated, learning, mental health, medical, physical, visual or temporary disabilities. SAS acts as a liaison between students and the faculty and staff of the University of Manitoba as well as service agencies within the province of Manitoba. SAS offers accommodations and programs to support students while they are at the University of Manitoba. All supports must be recommended and verified by an accredited health professional. SAS offers support and accommodations based on a student's individual needs and the academic standards of the university program.

Introduction

This is Student Accessibility Services' first official annual report providing information about the accommodations and services provided for registered students with disabilities at the University of Manitoba. The office has long compiled information on student case load, services and programs that was shared within Student Affairs. This report provides statistics and activity highlights for the reporting period from September 1, 2011 to August 31, 2012.

This report is being submitted to Senate based on the recommendations from the *ad hoc Committee of Senate Executive to Examine Accommodation of Students with Disabilities and Governance Procedures Related to Academic Requirements*. The format of this report is adapted from The University of Edinburgh Student Disability Service annual report.

The University of Manitoba has been providing services to students with disabilities since the late 1970's after a student group, the Physically Handicapped Concerns on Campus, lobbied for support. The first name of the office, was the Office of Disabled Students, which opened in the 1990s and then became the unit called Disability Services under Student Affairs. The most recent change in late 2011 – Student Accessibility Services – is a more inclusive and contemporary title. Student Accessibility Services reports to the Director of Student Advocacy and Accessibility, Student Services, Student Affairs.

Students

In a recent (December 2012) survey of registered students about the services and programs of SAS, the following comments were shared:

"A fantastic program!" "I am pleased that you provide this service; it is a good thing." "It's great having an SAS office at the Bannatyne campus. They provide excellent service!"

"The full time staff downstairs are excellent."

Comments such as these reflect the commitment of SAS staff to the work they do on behalf of students to provide an accessible university experience and the quality of the relationships that exist between staff and students.

Staff

The following team of staff have undertaken the mission of the unit and is poised to respond to students' requests for accommodations and other related services:

- the Coordinator, Carolyn Christie;
- four full time Accessibility Advisors Lisa Banash, Cindy Koskie, Jamie Penner and Arlana Vadnais;
- Test/Exam Administrator, Charity Pascual and Test/Exam Assistant, Jeff Buhse;
- invigilators;
- sign language interpreters;
- computerized/professional note-takers;
- academic attendants; and
- a group of committed volunteers and Peers.

Jamie Penner was Acting Coordinator while Carolyn Christie was away on leave January 2011-December 2011.

Space

Student Accessibility Services operates out of two main office spaces: the SAS Test Centre located at 155 University Centre and the advising offices located at 520 University Centre, (shared with Student Advocacy and the English Language Centre).

2

Key Features of Service Provision

Student Accessibility Services exists to support all students with disabilities to fully access their chosen course of study for which they are academically qualified. The majority of supports are provided through accommodations, such as extended time for exams. Information about the accommodation needs of a student are conveyed by SAS, in an electronic letter of accommodation sent to the instructor of the course, program director and where applicable, the Faculty Accommodation Team and/or Accessibility Committee.

Student Accessibility Services also provides additional support to students by way of programming, described below, and referrals to other Student Affairs departments, (e.g. Student Counseling and Career Centre, Academic Learning Centre), and student advisors on campus.

Student Accessibility Services works with each student to apply for funding through the Canada Student Grant program. Also, SAS works with outside funding agencies such as MarketAbilities (formerly Vocational Rehabilitation), Workers Compensation Board, and Manitoba Public Insurance to request funding for student supports and equipment. Students are eligible to use SAS services without such funding.

Typically, students with disabilities registered with SAS have increased every year since the first official unit records in 2001. Student registration is 5 times higher than it was in 2001. Even with this increase, registration is at the low end of the spectrum based on overall registration at the University of Manitoba.

Demographics

The number of students who registered with the SAS office decreased from 1174 in 2010-2011 to 1046 in 2011-2012. This can be attributed to a relatively stable enrolment at the University of Manitoba and more accurate record keeping in SAS with the use of the Clockwork database management system. Please refer to Table 1.

The National Educational Association of Disabled Students (NEADS) estimate that 7% of students enrolled at a university has a disability. The UM Office of Institutional Analysis data reported enrollment figures of 28,430 for 2011-2012. This means that last academic year, 1990 of students registered at the UM may have had a disability. Not all students with disabilities require or perceive a need to receive accommodations through SAS. A trend SAS is seeing is that a student may not access the office as an undergraduate but subsequently realizes the need to receive accommodations as a student in a professional/graduate program.

Of the students who registered with SAS for the 2011-2012 year, 602 self-identified as female, 397 male, and 47 did not disclose gender. Overall, 20 students self-identified as international students.

Students who have more than one disability represent 18% of the total students with disability population registered with Student Accessibility Services. The percentages in each category remain close to the last two years with students with cognitive disabilities and mental health disabilities remaining our two largest groups. Of note is the other/unclassified category that had an increase of 15% from 2010-2011. This category is for students who are waiting for full learning assessments or other medical reports or students who chose not to be identified as having a specific type of disability.

Another area of increase is in the category of cognitive for students with Asperger's syndrome. SAS staff have seen a marked increase in the past 5 years in this category. Students with Asperger's are the largest users of the academic attendant program explained in the program section.

In-person student meetings

Students must meet with an Accessibility Advisor to determine an individual accommodation plan for their academic program while registered at the UM. Follow up appointments are scheduled as necessary to complete funding paperwork, adjust accommodations, and to provide a 'check-in' and support for the student. Advisors provide in-person appointments, drop-in appointments, phone, email and texting support.

As part of their caseload, the Accessibility Advisors managed 1587 in-person student meetings. This number has decreased from 2010-2011, SAS can attribute this decrease to a staffing shortage (one less advisor in fall of 2011) which resulted in fewer appointments being available for students. This total does not include "point of contacts" which are students contacting advisors or the test centre via phone, email and text. The total amount of "point of contacts" for the year is 2935. As SAS recently started using the "point of contact" system, we expect that the number 2935 reflects mostly test centre contacts, not advising contacts. The advisors began using this "point of contact" system for the 2012-2013 academic year.

Advising staff are available for in-person student meetings throughout the year at all campuses of the UM. SAS maintains regular office hours at Fort Garry, Bannatyne and the William Norrie campuses. In-person student meetings are at their highest in the months of August and September, and increase again during midterms and just before finals in each semester.

Accommodations and Programs

Academic Attendant

During the 2011-2012 reporting year, 9 students used the Academic Attendant program for a total of 1362 hours. Seven attendants were hired to work with the students. The program offers on-campus, in-class assistance for students struggling with professor-student interaction, group-work and in-class presentations, note-taking, organizational study assistance, lecture reviews, and interaction with university staff. As stated earlier in this report, students with Asperger's syndrome are the largest users of the Academic Attendant program. This program is a significant benefit to the unit and receives high marks for service from students, parents and the Asperger's Association of Manitoba. The UM is the only institution in Manitoba and Canada offering such a program. SAS has received several inquiries from other institutions planning to start a similar program.

Assistive/Adaptive Technology and Alternate format production

Programs that SAS offers are: Kurzweil (text to speech and organization skills, most often used by students with learning disabilities), JAWS and Window Eyes (text to speech, most often used by students with visual disabilities), Read and Write Gold (text to speech alternative option), and Dragon (speech to text). Assistive technology and training have been available for over 5 years on a casual basis. SAS had received two outreach grants and COPSE funding to purchase technology and to fund a part time staff position to work with students. Currently, the assistive technology is available for student use in the Test Centre. The Test/Exam Assistant, Jeff Buhse, works with students to show them how to use the programs. Over the past year, Mr. Buhse worked with the UM Libraries Accessibility Services Implementation Team to create an adaptive technology space in Elizabeth Dafoe Library. Students are able to access equipment and space as of November 2012.

Most alternate format production is sent to Alternate Format Services (Manitoba) for production to e-text, audio and braille. However for last minute requests and articles, SAS provides in-house production for students. Mr. Buhse has completed the Level 1 Braille

production training to assist with materials. Also, SAS has purchased several pieces of brailling equipment that are housed in the Linguistics lab.

Coaching

The Coaching program assists students to better manage aspects of their life that interfere with their academic program. Coaches support, encourage, advise and confront while providing opportunities for skill development. Currently, SAS's certified life Coach is Lisa Banash. She works with students one on one for in person and telephone Coaching sessions. Students receive 10 Coaching sessions for the term on a fee for service basis.

There were 15 students in the Coaching program throughout the 2011-2012 reporting year for a total of 70 hours. There continues to be a wait list for this program however with one Coach whose primary duties are as an Accessibility Advisor, SAS cannot grow the program at this time.

Coaching is a unique service for an SAS office. SAS has found this type of program offered at four other institutions in Canada; University of British Columbia, St. Mary's University, Trent University and the University of Victoria. In a recent survey, a student commented that, "The *life coaching program has been one of the most invaluable experiences of my university career*". This program has been well rated by students and has shown students GPA improvement in the two years that students have been followed.

Professional and Volunteer Note-taking

The SAS Professional Note-taking (PNT) program and Volunteer Note-taking program (VNT) have continued to grow. The Professional Note-taking program consists of paid note-takers, usually students, who take hand-written or typed notes for students who are unable to take their own notes. In 2011-2012, SAS had 41 PNT staff provide support to 49 students who requested this service. There was an approximate total of 4524 hours of Professional Note-taking for the total year.

Volunteer Note-taking is a valuable service for students which could not continue without the support of instructors who recruit volunteers and the students who share notes for this program. In 2011-2012, 257 volunteers provided notes for courses. Volunteer note-takers can apply to have their co-curricular record reflect these volunteer hours.

Sign Language Interpretation and Computerized Note-taking

The Interpreting Program provides American Sign Language/English interpreting, as well as Computerized Note-taking (close to 'word for word' note-taking), for students who are Deaf or Hard-of-Hearing. Services are provided for students in the classroom, for meetings with instructors or other students, for laboratory and tutorial sessions, and for other academic situations as needed.

For 2011-2012, SAS had 12 Interpreters and 11 Computerized Note-takers working fulltime, part time and casual at Fort Garry campus. In addition, the Interpreters provided supervision

and mentorship to students enrolled in the American Sign Language/English Interpretation Program jointly offered by the University of Manitoba and Red River College.

The 4 Sign Language Interpreters at Bannatyne campus, working solely with a student in the faculty of Medicine, started providing interpretation for the Clinical portion of the Medicine degree. The clinical practicum is going well, assisted by a medical liaison, Dr. Duval who coordinates activities before the team starts a rotation and ensures the rotation runs smoothly. There are no computerized note-takers at the Bannatyne campus at this time.

Test/Exam Invigilation

Many students with disabilities require unique accommodations when writing tests and exams. The numbers of tests/exams invigilated in SAS for the year was 4,296, up from 3,563 in 2010-2011. Even though the overall number of students registered declined slightly this academic year, the needs and level of support that the students requested was higher. This would account for the dramatic increase in exams over the 2011-2012 reporting year. The request for this service fluctuates with the academic session cycle, with increases during mid terms (October and February) and final exams (December and April). The Test Centre has 8 private spaces for invigilation of tests/exams. During midterms and final exam periods, SAS must book rooms across campus and staffs up to 8 locations.

Tutoring

The tutor program was outsourced to the UMSU Registry and the Academic Learning Centre. SAS assists students in applying for tutoring funding and helps them to use the new registry. This continues to be an issue as many students do not qualify for funding, would benefit greatly from a tutor, and cannot pay on their own.

Educational Outreach

- SAS staff held Disability Awareness workshops for several groups on campus, including Peers, Student Advisors, Residence staff, instructors, New Faculty orientation, Libraries, and Human Resources. One session of note on accommodating students with ADHD in the classroom was offered in conjunction with UTS.
- SAS and UTS co-facilitated a three day institute for instructors, "Teaching to all Learners", showcasing universal design principles and excellent teaching practices.
- SAS presented for UTS' institute, "D2L", on accessible formats for online teaching.
- Access Awareness Day, an annual event, took place in February, showcasing SAS' mandate with an outreach to student advisors on campus.
- Bi-annual newsletters were circulated to SAS students, staff, and external disability community organizations. Weekly emails were sent to students with information about important topics such as; scholarships, test booking dates and UM events.

Community Outreach

- SAS staff maintained contact with various disability organizations including the Canadian Paraplegic Association, Canadian Mental Health Association, Manitoba Marketabilities, Employment Equity Committee, Society for Manitobans with Disabilities, Canadian Institute for the Blind, Canadian Centre on Disability Studies, and the Manitoba Deaf Association.
- Jamie Penner became a board member for Asperger's Manitoba.
- An annual Canadian Centre on Disability Studies delegation from the Ukraine attended a SAS information session.

Trends

Due to the 2008 change to the Americans with Disabilities Act in the U.S.A., U.S. institutions no longer rely on medical documentation as the primary source of registering students for accommodations. The April 2012 guidelines from the Association on Higher Education and Disability (AHEAD) state that students may request accommodation wherein primary documentation is self-identification, secondary is observation and interaction with SAS staff, and medical documentation is tertiary and minimally requested. Since this document was published in April 2012, there has been evidence of an impact in Canada. McGill University is the first Canadian institution to publish their policy change in this regard and SAS has been unofficially notified of other Canadian institutions considering this change. SAS will continue to monitor this trend.

Summary

The staff members at Student Accessibility Services feel well supported by the University of Manitoba and able to respond to the needs of students in a timely fashion. Currently, there are specific areas that SAS is working on in order to improve services. SAS is actively engaged in implementing the recommendations that arose from the *ad hoc Committee of Senate Executive to Examine Accommodations of Students with Disabilities and Governance Procedures Related to Academic Requirements.* These changes include, for example, the revision of policy and procedures, the submission of the SAS annual report, enhanced education about SAS and disability on campus, and improvements to general operational practices.

SAS would like to thank students, faculty, staff and the University of Manitoba community for their continued support and assistance.

Dear Dr. Barnard:

In accordance with the Student Discipline By-Law, I hereby submit the Annual Report of the University Discipline Committee (UDC) for the period September 1, 2011 to August 31, 2012. The attached Report on University Discipline cases summarizes all offenses and dispositions reported to me. I wish to thank all those offices who responded quickly to my request for submissions.

The UDC has continued to produce its report in chart format, and we have maintained the two major divisions, the first dealing with varying forms of "Academic Dishonesty" and the second addressing disciplinary matters which involve "Inappropriate Behaviour". Within each of the two major categories, like disciplinary matters have been grouped together for easier reference. Further, we have provided two graphs which offer a visual overview of disciplinary matters. The graphs span a five-year period.

I would make the following observations concerning the report's contents:

- 1) The overall numbers of incidents increased this year in relation to last year, both in raw numbers and as a percentage of the student body. The numbers remain generally consistent in most categories compared to last year's results with the exception of:
 - a. increases in reported incidents of:
 - Part 1: Contravention of examination regulations and plagiarism;
 - Part 2: Disorderly conduct and unprofessional conduct; and
 - b. decreases in reported incidents of: Part 1: Cheating on mid-term tests, copying from other student's/own previous work; and Part 2: Computer-related incidents and vandalism.

The University undertakes many worthwhile efforts to increase awareness about plagiarism and yet reported incidents continue to rise. It would appear that the university community needs to continue our collective efforts in this area.

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2) There are six incidents that were carried over from last year as all appeals had not been exhausted in the previous reporting period. These incidents are not included in the final numbers as they were counted in last year's annual report.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: February 6, 2013

GENERAL

On December 6th, the university launched the Visionary (re)Generation International Urban Design Competition, from which a successful design team will be selected that will be charged with the development of a campus plan to guide future growth and development, including the 120-acre Southwood precinct. The deadline for teams to register was January 14th and as of the deadline, there were 687 individual registrants from 73 different countries. The competition website is located at <u>www.visionaryregeneration.com</u>.

For over thirty years, the University of Manitoba has partnered with the University of Nairobi to advance the understanding and treatment of HIV/AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases; collaborative work that has resulted in significant progress. Earlier in January 2013, I met with Professor Magoha, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Nairobi, and signed an agreement that extends this relationship for another five years and adds new commitments to collaboration in maternal and child health, agriculture and education.

On 17 January 2013, the redeveloped main floor of the Elizabeth Dafoe library was officially opened, showcasing a \$5.5 million investment that has resulted in mechanical and electrical upgrades as well as an increase in study space and computer workstations, a one-stop service desk, collaborative media space, versatile teaching spaces and improved washrooms. Future phases of this project will continue the improvements on the main floor, and implement additional upgrades on the 2nd and 3rd floors of the library.

It is a priority for the university to develop and nurture relationships with the community it serves, to better understand the perspectives and needs that exist in the community and to identify ways in which the university is able to be an effective partner. As part of the university's process of engagement, it has become our practice to have regular breakfasts with community leaders, focused on specific areas of expertise. In November, I met with eighteen leaders from the community about addressing issues of poverty, health and sustainable communities, and our discussions focused primarily on importance of partnerships to community building. This month's meeting focused on active and healthy communities.

The University of Manitoba hosted members from the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada in December, which subsequently were followed by regular meetings of the U-15 in Toronto. Among other things, the university's participation in these bodies allows for meaningful dialogue and exchange of ideas among peer institutions about issues of common interest in the post-secondary system, an ability to advocate on behalf of the interests of higher learning and university research, and a platform from which collaboration can grow.

- Dentistry alumni Allan Cogan (90), Manitoba Dental Association president and periodontist, Bruce McFarlane (84), Winnipeg orthodontist, and Gerald Uswak (89), Dean of Dentistry at the University of Saskatchewan were inducted as Fellows in the Pierre Fauchard Academy, an international honour dental organization, at the 2012 Canadian Section Awards and Installation Ceremonies in Saskatoon, SK this past September.
- Joan Durrant, family social sciences, was awarded the Health Promotion and Innovation Award of Excellence from the Canadian Institute of Child Health for her co-authored statement on Physical Punishment of Children and Youth.
- Janice Filmon, human ecology alumna, was awarded a Member of the Order of Canada for voluntary service on December 31, 2012.
- The Institute of Certified Management Consultants of Manitoba (CMC-Manitoba) has named Douglas E. Finkbeiner, QC, and Roland Penner, CM, QC as the inaugural recipients of the Institute's Honorary Fellow designation, FCMC (Hon.). Both men played a significant role in ensuring that the public interest is served. Doug Finkbeiner is a partner of the law firm Taylor McCaffrey LLP and was instrumental in assisting the Institute to obtain its governing legislation. Roland Penner, senior scholar and former dean of the Faculty of Law and Manitoba's Attorney General in 1986, was responsible for the introduction of the provincial statute governing the CMC designation in Manitoba.

The event is the world's premier competition for students running revenue-generating businesses. Brett represented Canada with his two businesses, Sheffield Farms and Stay Fit Health Club.
- Josh Jung, computer science student; Aman Sachar, computer engineering student and Alex Sachs, management student, have been invited to attend the Association for Computing Machinery (ACM), International Collegiate Programming Contest 2013 world finals to be held June 30-July 4, 2013, in St. Petersburg, Russia. Special congratulations to Dr. Mike Domaratzki, Computer Science, for his work and support of the UM team.

Very few computer science departments achieve this standing. To put it in perspective, in 2012, out of the 300,000 participating students, 2,219 teams advanced to the regional finals, of which only 17 American universities (MIT, Carnegie Mellon, Stanford, etc.) and only six Canadian universities (Toronto, UBC, Waterloo, Calgary, Lethbridge and Manitoba) have teams. In total, only 112 teams worldwide receive an invitation to participate.

• For the third consecutive year, University of Manitoba Faculty of Architecture students and their professors have had their visionary design accepted into the Forks Market's Warming Hut

competition. "WEAVE WAVE" is one of this year's winning designs. The Weave Wave hut evokes the historical relationship and physical confluence of the Red and Assiniboine Rivers.

- Student Life partnered with the GSA, UMSU, Student Accessibility Services, Human Rights Advisory Services, Student Services and the International Centre for Students to bring Mr. Spencer West to the University of Manitoba on November 1, to share his story on leadership, perseverance and positive thinking. Over 300 staff, faculty, community members and students from all three of our Winnipeg campuses participated in the event.
- On December 18, the Desautels Faculty of Music held a vigil, "Ana Grace: A vigil of music and words", to honour the memory of Ana Grace Marquez-Greene, the other victims, and the many families impacted by the Newtown tragedy. Jimmy Greene, Ana's father, was a faculty member from 2009-11 in the Desautels Faculty of Music. This past summer, the Marquez-Greene family returned to Connecticut where Jimmy began a new appointment as Assistant Director of Jazz Studies at West Connecticut State University.
- In September 2012, the Science Students Association (SSA) introduced a new, free tutoring program aimed at helping Faculty of Science students improve their grades. To become a volunteer tutor, students require a minimum grade of an "A" in the course for which they were tutoring. Volunteer tutors are eligible for the new SSA Scholarships and the volunteer work can qualify for the co-curricular record on students' transcripts. For the fall term, the SSA matched 20 tutors with 28 students.
- The staff of the Academic Learning Centre organized a successful and inaugural "Long Night Against Procrastination" in close partnership with the staff of the Elizabeth Dafoe Library and UMSU. As a result, 137 students attended this all night academic study opportunity and were provided with the support of librarians and writing tutors.

RESEARCH MATTERS

 Drs. Janice Ristock (Women's and Gender Studies, Vice-Provost Academic Affairs) and Cheryl Rockman-Greenberg (Pediatrics and Child health, Biochemistry and Medical Genetics, Manitoba Institute of Child Health, Winnipeg Regional Health Authority) were awarded the Women's Executive Network's top 100 Most Powerful Women 2012 in Canada, in the "trailblazers and trendsetters" category, on December 4, 2012.

The Toronto-based network selects women who are strong contributors in their fields, organizations and communities. Ristock was recognized for how her work on gender and sexuality has changed society's view of domestic abuse. The women's and gender studies professor began investigating violence in lesbian relationships when there was only one book on the topic and very little academic research. Her efforts helped inform policymakers about the lack of services that exist for these women and changed the landscape of support programming.

Rockman-Greenberg was recognized for identifying the importance of molecular medicine and was the driving force behind the opening of the first lab in Winnipeg for the diagnosis of genetic disease with DNA testing. She and her colleagues have identified the molecular source of some of

Manitoba's most devastating inherited diseases, including those most prevalent in the province's Aboriginal, Mennonite and Hutterite communities.

Four University of Manitoba professors have been recognized by the WXN Network: Ristock, Rockman-Greenburg, Dr. Wanda Wuttunee (Native Studies, 2011) and President Emeritus Emőke Szathmáry (2004).

• The Institute of Cardiovascular Sciences at St. Boniface Hospital Research held their 14th Annual Awards Event on December 3, 2012. Both international and local members of the cardiovascular research community were honoured. The annual award event recognizes leadership and success in promoting cardiovascular research and education, lifetime achievements in research, and young scientists who are in the early stage of their academic life.

Ms. Nancy Klos, Associate Director (Research Grants), Research Services, Office of the Vice-President (Research and International) was awarded the Jack Litvack Exemplary Service Award. This award is given to an individual or agency that has provided, over several years, exemplary service in their line of work to the Institute of Cardiovascular Sciences.

The Institute of Cardiovascular Sciences is a partnership between the University of Manitoba and St. Boniface Hospital, and is a leading force in the fight against heart disease at the cellular and molecular levels. The multidisciplinary program includes over 100 researchers investigating heart pathophysiology, electrophysiology, cellular and molecular biology. The Institute's awards program was produced in collaboration with the University of Manitoba, St-Boniface Hospital Foundation, the Royal Bank of Canada and Heart & Stroke Foundation of Manitoba.

- The 7th annual Undergraduate Research Poster Competition was held on November 1, 2012. A record-breaking 210 budding researchers displayed the results of their projects in one of five categories: applied sciences, creative works, health sciences, natural sciences, and social sciences/humanities. The research completed by students under the supervision and mentorship of faculty members ranged from topics as diverse as the driving habits of older adults to the effects of aspirin on kidney function. This year's numbers doubled, partially due to the number of students entering posters who completed their research as recipients of the Undergraduate Research Awards program, launched by the Vice-president (Research and International) in the summer of 2012.
- On November 7, 2012, the Gaming, Graphics, Animation, and New Media Network of Centres of Excellence (GRAND), in association with Wavefront and the Canadian Digital Media Network (CDMN) hosted a full-day workshop at the University of Manitoba entitled "Catching Canada's Digital Wave." This workshop brought together members of industry, researchers, government, and venture companies for a series of presentations highlighting network research, funding opportunities, and technology transfer and commercialization avenues.
- The new Research Integrity (RI) online course has had 171 users within the University of Manitoba research community enroll in one or more of the RI online course modules.

ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

- The financial terms of the University's negotiations with the Association of Employees Supporting Education Services (AESES) was recently determined by an arbitrator. The arbitrator ruled that the four (4) year agreement (2011-2015) would have no increase to the salary ranges and salaries of employees for the first two (2) years instead of no salary increases in the first and third year as proposed by the Association. The decision resulted in similar financial terms for AESES members as for other University unionized and non-unionized support staff.
- Two implementation working groups have been created to implement the **Wayfinding Strategy**. A communications strategy is being developed and the Wayfinding Strategy will be posted on the Campus Planning Office web site. An RFP will be issued in early January to engage a consultant to develop the wayfinding brand, design guidelines and kiosk/signage specs.

The **Bannatyne Master Plan** is in final draft form, receiving preliminary endorsement from the Bannatyne Campus Master Plan Steering Committee (comprised of Deans of the campus and HSC). It will be presented to PET in early January and following their approval, next steps will include:

- o a comprehensive engagement process will be initiated for external and internal stakeholders.
- Bannatyne Space Master Plan taking a detailed look at interior requirements using the draft master plan as a guide.
- Residence Study looking at the feasibility of a Bannatyne Campus Residence.

Educational Consulting Services (ECS), the Space Master Plan consultants, were on campus for a week to initiate the **Fort Garry Campus Space Master Plan** process, a 52-week project. The Space Master Plan will guide the short, mid and long-term development and use of the available space and building assets and make informed recommendations on reallocations, renovations, new

construction and demolition for the Fort Garry Campus. Coordinated through the Campus Planning Office with Sonja Stroud, new University Space Planner, leading the process. A steering committee, chaired by Paul Kochan, has been set up to provide guidance to the project.

The **Space Master Plan** will guide future investments and the allocation of building assets at the Fort Garry Campus. It will be very comprehensive and will identify and/or address qualitative, quantitative and implementation issues. It will be used as a 'set up' to a permanent space planning management system including the application of equitable standards.

Fort Garry Campus Interim Space Management –space reallocation requests, unless of an urgent nature, will be tabled until the master plan is completed. The Campus Planning Office is currently drafting an approach to work with users in the interim to assist with addressing issues without contemplating major space reallocations. This approach will take into consideration urgent situations.

EXTERNAL MATTERS

Marketing and Communications Office:

• In November, arrangements were made to have the pillars in the arrivals area of the Richardson International Airport wrapped with University of Manitoba branding messages. The wrapped pillars reflect the ``I am a Trailblazer`` campaign and feature outstanding University of Manitoba faculty. The pillars will be wrapped for at least one year.

Philanthropy:

- As of January 11, 2013 the university has raised \$16,081,996.06 in this fiscal year. Significant gifts include:
 - \$647,167.87 from the estate of Perry Ross that will be used for bursaries.
 - A gift of \$200,000 came from the Manitoba Métis Federation Inc. for the Louis Riel Bursaries at the University of Manitoba.
 - \$116,783.59 from the estate of John M. Stoddart for the John (Jack) MacDonald Lederman and Jack MacDonell Bursary
- On January 7, 2013, Derek McLean joined the Planned Giving Team as Planned Giving Officer on a one-year term while Monica Carlberg is on maternity leave.

Government and Community Engagement:

- External Relations met with three Ministers from November 2012 to January 2013: Minister of Conversation and Water Stewardship Gord Mackintosh; the Minister of Family Services and Labour Jennifer Howard; and Minister of Children and Youth Opportunities Kevin Chief. Discussions focused on water quality; climate change research and its connection to government priorities; the University's inner city community engagement; and Indigenous Achievement.
- On November 26th External Relations, in partnership with the Faculty of Engineering, hosted 40 municipal officials from across Manitoba at the Fort Garry Campus. The group received an overview of the University, an update on research activities and a tour of some of the infrastructure research labs on campus.

- The University hosted two Visionary Conversations events in November and December: The True North: Canada's Final Frontier and Trailblazing Indigenous Success respectively. November's panelists included James Fergusson, Professor, Political Studies, Faculty of Arts; Norman Halden, Dean, Clayton H. Riddell Faculty of Environment, Earth and Resources; Chris Trott, Associate Professor, Native Studies, Faculty of Arts; Warden and Vice-Chancellor, St. John's College; and Omut Ozsu, Assistant Professor, Faculty of Law. December's panelists included: Deborah Young, Executive Lead, Indigenous Achievement, Office of the President; Michael Hart, Canada Research Chair in Indigenous Knowledge and Social Work, Faculty of Social Work; Catherine Cook, Associate Dean, First Nations, Métis and Inuit Health; and Heather McRae, Indigenous Research and Knowledge Exchange Coordinator, Acting Director of Rec and Read.
- The University has secured funding from the Agriculture and Agri-Foods Canada (AAFC) for the establishment and ongoing activities of the new Professorship in Agricultural Risk Management and Insurance at the I.H. Asper School of Business. AAFC is prepared to contribute \$500,000.00 over five years. The proposed mandate for the Professorship supports research into a broad range of agricultural risk management tools so that Canadian producers can effectively manage the agricultural risks they encounter in their farming operations.

Alumni Relations:

- An alumni engagement and preferences survey is currently being conducted by the Alumni Relations office. Over 47,000 emails were sent to alumni inviting them to participate in the survey. To date there have been over 2160 responses. The survey will close January 25, 2013. Alumni Relations is encouraging all alumni to complete the survey at <u>www.alumnisurvey.ca/uofm</u>. The data received from this survey will be shared with the university and will be used to make informed decisions regarding alumni relations activities.
- Following the signing of the new agreement between the Alumni Association Inc. and the University of Manitoba, the Alumni board took time to revisit their structure. One of the most significant changes they have implemented is the addition of three key committees: Celebrating Alumni Achievement, Student Engagement and Experiences, and Lifelong Learning. These areas of focus are also the three key pillars of best practice in Alumni Relations which allows the board and the Alumni Relations office to align their strategic planning and priority setting.
- The Alumni Association Inc. presents one award each year to a Distinguished Alumni Award recipient. Nominations close February 15, 2013. All alumni are invited to nominate an alumnus who demonstrates:
 - o Outstanding professional achievement or
 - Significant service to the University of Manitoba or
 - o Significant contributions to the community and welfare of others

I am writing in support of a minor amendment to the Christine Egan Memorial Scholarship, which is administered by the University of Manitoba. This scholarship supports the study of Nunavut nursing students. As the scholarship is open only to Inuit people from Nunavut, it is considered a discriminatory award. It has previously been granted an exemption to the University policy on non-acceptance of discriminatory awards, as it addresses the socioeconomic and health disadvantages faced by the Inuit people of Nunavut, which have been well documented.

The proposed amendment is a small technical one, that formalizes a mechanism put in place last year to help stabilize the amount of funding awarded following the transit of the scholarship from the MMCF to the University of Manitoba. Apart from that, there have been no changes in the circumstances and justification for the scholarship, as presented to the Senate Committee on Awards in April 2011. On behalf of the Department of Community Health Sciences, I fully support the continuance of this award, as amended. I would be pleased to provide any additional information or clarifications.

Please accept this letter as formal support for the amendment proposed to the Christine Egan Memorial Scholarship. I understand that t is the wishes of the family that her Memorial Scholarship specifically benefit and assist Inuit students pursuing a Nursing degree because of Ms. Egan's 'love of Nursing and her commitment to the health and education in Nunavut'. Indigenous students are still very much under-represented at the University of Manitoba and in all faculties, including Nursing but it is the Inuit population specifically that is the most under-represented*.

As the Director of the Aboriginal Student Centre, I continue to voice the concern, and can verify, that financial strain is the <u>leading cause</u> for Indigenous students leaving school before graduation. It is common knowledge that many Aboriginal peoples live in poverty and whereas a university education can help rectify this, most cannot afford to do so and few have the privilege of obtaining financial support from their families. Bursaries and scholarships are a <u>major component</u> of a successful retention plan.

The number of Aboriginal students attending the University of Manitoba continues to increase and, I believe, is partially due to the financial assistance made available through scholarships such as this. The Christine Egan Memorial Scholarship will provide assistance specifically for Inuit students from Nunavut and thereby assist with increasing the Inuit representation at the University of Manitoba.

THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON UNIVERSITY RESEARCH REPORT ON THE REVIEW OF THE Manitoba Institute for Materials (MIM)

Preamble:

- 1. The Policy for *Research Centres, Institutes and Groups*, stipulates that all research centres/institutes be reviewed by the Senate Committee on University Research (SCUR) on a periodic basis but not less than once every 5 years. Accordingly and following the approval by Senate of this Policy, the Senate Committee on University Research established a schedule for the review of all research centres/institutes.
- 2. For each research centre/institute identified for review, a sub-committee of the Senate Committee on University Research was established. In accordance with the Policy, the task of each sub-committee was to recommend to SCUR on whether a formal, independent review committee should be struck to conduct a full review. If a subcommittee was of the view that a full review of a specific research centre/institute was not warranted, it was further charged with recommending to SCUR on the continuance or termination of the research centre/institute.

Observations:

- 1. The review process followed that which is outlined in section 3.3.1 of the Policy, and involved a review of annual reports of each centre/institute as well as a report prepared by each research centre/institute director which contained:
 - A description of how and why the centre/institute has achieved or revised its original objectives; a detailed listing of its research and training accomplishments; a current membership list; and a detailed financial statement;
 - a five-year plan which identifies future research directions and development strategies;
 - letters indicating continued support for the research/centre institute from appropriate department heads and faculty/school deans/directors; and
 - the names of individuals who could provide external assessments of the research centre/institute.
- 2. The membership of this sub-committee was as follows:
 - Dr. Tony Iacopino, Chair, Dean, Faculty of Dentistry Dr. Gordon Fitzell, Associate Professor, Faculty of Music Dr. Michael Trevan, Dean, Faculty of Agricultural & Food Sciences
- 3. The assessment of the sub-committee was as follows:

The inaugural Senate Committee on University Research review (March 5, 2009) of the Manitoba Institute for Materials (MIM) recommended a three-year approval period to be followed by another review to ensure that the MIM was meeting its proposed goals and objectives. The major points to be addressed were documentation of a full-time support staff position for the institute director and evidence that working mechanisms were in place for submitting/approving research grants and promotion/publicity for research outputs.

Over the past three years, the MIM has performed very well and has met its goals/objectives as demonstrated by:

- Establishment of a website for the Institute (*materials.umanitoba.ca*) that integrates infrastructure descriptions, access and contacts as well as promoting institute accomplishments
- Initiation of an undergraduate materials methods course in Engineering and Science to complement an existing course in Environment.
- Creation of an annual Manitoba Materials Conference that brings together the membership and students spanning 4 Faculties and 8 departments as well as participant from regional universities (Winnipeg, Lakehead and UND), Industrial and Government professionals
- Submission of MIM-led, multi-investigator proposals to Western Economic Diversification (\$3M) and CFI (\$10M) to enhance existing infrastructure, to secure new capabilities and to renovate space to house existing and new MIM infrastructure
- Facilitation of multi-investigator research proposals to support collaborative research partnerships; strong support letters from MIM partners
- MIM is financially supported by the Faculties of Science, Engineering and Environment with additional support from the Departments of Chemistry, Physics, Food Science, Electrical and Computer, Mechanical and Manufacturing, and Civil Engineering with a total annual operating budget of \$76K/year; annual operating funds go toward part-time administrative support, the Manitoba Materials Conference, teaching relief for the Director, office setup/operation
- MIM researchers attract on average ~\$5M annually in research support and approximately 20% of the University's total NSERC income (over the past three years, a total of ~\$15M has been received from external sources)
- There are 55 research-active members supervising approximately 20 postdoctoral scholars, 50 PhD/ 60 MSc students, and more than 100 invited presentations by members each year
- The five-year MIM strategic plan is appropriately focused on developing space, expanding and maintaining multi-user infrastructure, strengthening educational and training capabilities, maintaining research strength through CRC advancement and recruitment, strengthening ties with industry, and developing interdisciplinary research directions. The plan details considerations for funding based on currently available sources and external sources that will be solicited.

Overall, The MIM appears to be a highly active and relatively stable organization. Moreover, it appears to be en route to achieving its stated objectives of encouraging and fostering more networking and collaboration among researchers, and increasing the visibility of its research programs both internally and externally. The approach to establishing an environment for shared infrastructure and integration of facilities appears to be effective as it has fostered work with external collaborators and industry. The MIM has established itself as a productive and responsible entity and has an excellent record of activity with regard to acquisition of external funding and research/training. The institute appears to be succeeding admirably in meeting its goals of increasing visibility and opportunity for multidisciplinary materials research at the University of Manitoba.

The MIM's five-year plan outlines the organization's future research directions and development strategies demonstrating its financial viability and sustainability. At the forefront are plans to build upon its success with multi-user infrastructure. Together with this initiative, the institute cites development of space as a key goal, especially space for future acquisitions. In terms of office and infrastructure space, the MIM has not yet made great strides in establishing a physical presence. However, this has not had a significant negative impact on the institute's rather impressive collective work. The MIM also notes its intention to maintain research strength through CRC advancement and recruitment, an area where it has demonstrated success. The development of a course offering speaks to its stated objective of creating a vibrant educational environment. Strong letters of support for the institute further strengthen its proposal for a second term. Additionally, the organization is jointly supported by various units and governed by a rigorous committee structure.

The MIM requests additional baseline budget to fund full-time administrative support staff. It would appear that the MIM could easily fund this administrative support from indirect cost recovery related to external grants. Thus, there is no enthusiasm for additional baseline funding. There is no need for external review at this time. However, this may be something that is strongly considered in the future.

Recommendation:

The Senate Committee on University Research recommend to Senate:

THAT the Manitoba Institute for Materials (MIM) be renewed for a five year period.

Report of the Implementation Working Group for the Cooper Commission Report

Preamble

- 1. The Implementation Working Group for the Cooper Commission Report (the "Working Group") was established by the Senate Executive Committee on May 2, 2012.
- 2. The terms of reference for the working group are:
 - a. To establish a detailed plan for the implementation of the Cooper Commission recommendations;
 - b. To delegate tasks and establish groups to develop the necessary policies, processes and activities to meet the recommendations;
 - c. To research and encourage the incorporation of work done at other similar institutions in the areas identified in the recommendations;
 - d. To provide bi-monthly reports to Senate Executive and Senate on the progress of implementation;
 - e. To propose timelines for the implementation of Cooper Commission recommendations.
- 3. This is the second progress report of the working group to Senate Executive and Senate.

Observations

- 1. Since last reporting, the working group has met on four occasions –October 4, 2012, November 13, 2012, December 12, 2012 and January 10, 2013.
- 2. As previously reported, the Working Group has organized the recommendations into three broad areas for implementation: Policy Development, Standards Identification, and Educate & Inform.
- 3. With respect to Policy Development, the following draft documents have been developed and are in early stages of review and consultation:
 - a. revised Accessibility for Students with Disabilities Policy and Procedures including definitions
 - b. begun drafting a general University of Manitoba policy on Accessibility.
 - c. template terms of reference for Faculty-based Accessibility Advisory Committees, based on the Faculty of Medicine document, to consider accommodations that are not routine
 - d. template annual reports for Accessibility Advisory Committees
 - e. template terms of reference for Faculty-based Accommodation teams
- 4. With respect to Standards Identification, a sub-group has been formed to develop templates and guidelines for the identification of Bona Fide Academic Requirements and templates for course-based BFARs (to understand and work towards program-based BFARs) for non-accredited programs and Essential Skills Documents for accredited professional programs. The group is being led by Dean Jeff Taylor, a member of the Working Group and includes Mark Torchia (UTS), Joanne Hamilton (Medicine), Robert Renaud (Education), Semone Myrie (Human Ecology), Archie McNicol (Dentistry and Graduate Studies) and Terri Ashcroft (Nursing). The sub-group is meeting often and expects to make

recommendations to the Working Group for subsequent consideration by Senate in the late winter/early spring 2013.

- 5. With respect to the Educate & Inform area, the following have been developed:
 - a. an inventory of all educational events offered by the Office of Fair Practices and Legal Affairs and Student Accessibility Services
 - b. a presentation has been developed by the Office of Fair Practices and Legal Affairs and Student Services (including Student Accessibility Services and Student Advocacy) to offer to units across campus schedule to ensure that all units receive presentations on issues around accommodation, focusing first on faculties and units that provide supports to students
 - c. an annual report of Student Accessibility Services which will be widely distributed throughout the University Community
 - d. enhancements to information and forms available on the web through Student Accessibility Services. Some information is already posted and some will be made available over the next year through a re-developed web site.
 - e. a presentation summarizing the issues of accommodation, accessibility and the work of the Cooper Commission and the Working Group. Dr. Smith, Mr. Leclerc and Mr. Juliano made this presentation to the Board of Governors on November 20. This presentation will be made at an upcoming meeting of Senate, likely in February.
- 6. The Working Group also observes that the report and recommendation of the Cooper Commission has generated interest from other Universities in Canada who have been in contact to request permission to use the recommendations in the development of strategies at their institutions. Where it is possible, we are sharing information with these institutions in an effort to improve the work we are doing as well.
- 7. The Working Group continues to welcome comments, suggestions and feedback from members of the University community.
- 8. We would like to thank the members of the Working Group and the subgroups that have been formed for their hard work and dedication. We look forward to continuing to report progress towards our goals in the months to come.

AD-HOC COMMITTEE OF SENATE EXECUTIVE TO EXAMINE THE ACCOMMODATION OF STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

- The "Cooper Commission"
- Established by Senate Executive in an effort to look at general issues related to accommodation of students with disabilities
- Chaired by Dr. Archie Cooper, Professor Emeritus



COOPER COMMISSION

Mandate was to "discuss, consider and make recommendations on issues related to the accommodation of students with disabilities", including a review of:

-How to balance the University's legal obligation to offer reasonable accommodations to students with disabilities while protecting academic standards;

- -What type of accommodations may be offered, with out compromising academic standards;
- -Who should decide on whether accommodations should be offered, and if so, what type;
- -What types of evidence of disability should the decision maker require;
- -With whom is a decision maker expected to consult;
- -How do ensure timely decisions on accommodation are made, so that a student's academic progress is not compromised; and,
- -How to protect the privacy of students while assessing a case and implementing accommodations.



COOPER COMMISSION WORK

- Met 18 times between February, 2011 and February 2012
- Heard from experts, researched practices here and at other universities
- Issued an interim report and sought feedback from the University Community
- Presented a final report to Senate in April, 2012 with 9 detailed recommendations
- Senate approved the recommendations in principle and asked Senate Executive to develop an implementation plan



WHAT IS A DISABILITY?

- Not defined in *The Human Rights Code*
- Says only that we may not discriminate and must try to accommodate "physical or mental disability or related characteristics or circumstances"

UBC v. BERG – 1993 SCC

- Graduate student with depression
- Denied key to facilities, excluded from an internship
- Universities are a service provider under the Code
- Duty to accommodate mental disability



MENTAL DISABILITIES

- Are the most controversial and difficult to accommodate because they are hidden
- Accommodations may impact academic standards
- May include depression, anxiety and panic disorders (including exam anxiety)

SINGH v. UBC – 2010 BCCA

- Student with a number of difficulties,
 - including an anxiety disorder causing exam anxiety
- Court does not even question that exam anxiety requires accommodation
- School did enough



REASONABLE ACCOMODATION

- Must offer accommodations which are reasonable, not necessarily perfect – needs, not desires
- Students obligated to accept reasonable offer
- Process is as important as the accommodation (flexible, private, individualized, respectful, timely)

GREEN v. MT ST VINCENT – 2010 NS HRC

- Student with dyslexia and attention deficit disorder
- School offers many accommodations (time, space, reader, scribe, proctor)
- Student refuses to write
- School acted reasonably, student fails



UNDUE HARDSHIP

- Obligation is to accommodate to the point of undue hardship
- High threshold comes from case law, not the Code
- Undue hardship can include cost, inconvenience, competing obligations, impact on others, safety or other risks

COUNCIL OF CDN w/ DISABILITIES v. VIA – 2007 SCC

- VIA purchases rail cars which are not accessible
- Cost of retrofitting as much as \$92 million
- Court looked an context and size of VIA's entire operation, finding it not to be an undue hardship

UNIVERSITY of Manitoba

UNDUE HARDSHIP AT UNIVERSITIES

- Undue hardship based on cost will usually fail
- Huge financial risk, as schools become victim of their own successful past accommodations
- Manitoba schools are exposed due to the lack of a Provincial funding system to support accommodations

HOWARD v. UBC – 1993 BC HRC

- Deaf student requires interpreter
- School argues cost of \$40k per year is undue hardship
- Many student each year require similar service
- Court finds cost a "minor interference"



BONA FIDE REQUIREMENTS

- The best way to protect academic standards is to demonstrate bona fide academic requirements
- Code says schools may discriminate if there is a "bona fide and reasonable cause" for the discrimination
 - Must still try to accommodate

MEIORIN – 1999 SCC

- Female firefighter unable to pass aerobic fitness test
- Three part test:
 - Rational connection
 - Good faith
 - Necessary
- Court finds essential job duties can be performed without passing test



BONA FIDE'S AT UNIVERSITY

- Each program must consider and document which of its requirements are essential to ensure they are not compromised
- Easier in some programs than others (professional or accredited programs)
- Easier to defend essential skills than method of demonstrating

MATTHEWS v. MEMORIAL – 1991 NFLD HRC

- Medical student with speech impediment
- School says it would impact patient confidence
- School's behaviour impacted student's ability to perform
- No evidence that standards could not be met



RISKS AND LIABILITY

- Failure to provide reasonable accommodation will result in a variety of risks (financial, reputational)
- Enormous resources in fighting claims
- Claims are uninsured

MOORE v. BC – 2012 SCC

- Student with dyslexia denied special service after grade 2, forced into private school
- School district defends on the basis of undue hardship related to cost, budget crisis
- School district closed a centre, making services unavailable to all disabled students
- Student awarded the cost of private school for his entire career





COMMON PITFALLS

- Not bona fide attempt to enforce standards without any evidence that they are essential
- Not cooperative unsupportable arguments of undue hardship due to cost or inconvenience
- **Not timely** process too cumbersome, too many people involved, student delayed in progression
- Not private breaches of FIPPA and PHIA
- Not respectful question professional diagnosis, Accessibility Services process



UM & ACCESSIBILITY

- UM strives to ensure an accessible learning and working environment and is thereby committed to providing reasonable accommodation of the needs of persons with documented disabilities
- The UM supports an accessible learning environment where students with disabilities, who are admitted to UM, can gain access to all programs for which they are academically qualified



OBJECTIVES OF THIS SECTION

STUDENT ACCESSIBILITY SERVICES

- Mission is to provide services to students with disabilities and ensure an accessible post-secondary education environment
- Acts as a liaison between students and faculty and staff as well as support agencies within Manitoba
- Recommends accommodations for students with documented disabilities



STUDENT ACCESSIBILITY SERVICES IN PRACTICE

- Dedicated staff and student volunteers
- Provide a central service on behalf of UM to adhere to the Accessibility Policy and follow the Procedures
- Confidential (FIPPA and PHIA)
- Works closely with the student, the faculty/school and other allied units
 - SCCC, UHS, Student Advocacy, Fair Practice & Legal Affairs
 - Special programs e.g., Learning Disability Services
 Clinic



SAS DATA (2011/12)

- 1048 registered students (NEADS estimates ~ 7% of students in PSI has a disability)
- Categories of disabilities:
 - Mental health (334 or 32%)
 - Deaf/hard of hearing (62 or 6%)
 - Physical /Medical (181 or 17%)
 - Cognitive (311 or 30%)
 - Blind/visual (23 or 2%)
 - Temporary/Other (137 or 13%)
- A high percentage of 'hidden disabilities'



STEPS IN PROVISION OF SERVICES

- Student registers with SAS
- Student provides professional documents
 - assessment from an 'accredited health professional' e.g., physician, psychologist
 - includes recommendations re accommodations
- Partnership student/faculty/SAS (e.g. forms)
- Match reasonable accommodation to meet documented disability
 - 'best practices', standard accommodations
 - uphold academic standard ('bona-fide academic requirements')



TYPICAL ACCOMMODATIONS

- Test and exam accommodations (extra time, private room)
- Computerized note-taking services
- Sign language interpretation (ASL)
- Tutors
- Special classroom equipment and adaptive technology



CHANGING LANDSCAPE & CHALLENGES

- Increased number of students with disabilities
- Different types of disabilities being presented ('hidden', more complex)
- Different approaches (e.g. universal design)
- What is reasonable? 'Best practices' constantly revisited and revised
- Better documented academic standards (BFAR's) and essential skills documents (professional faculties)
- Role of technology (e.g. adaptive specialist train students)



WHAT WE ARE DOING WELL

- Expertise of staff reliable partners in supporting student success
- Cooperation of faculty and staff
- Very high success rate for students
- Piloting new best practices e.g, coaching program and academic attendant program
- Hired a Health and Wellness Educator
- Proposal Mental Health Strategy (proposal to hire professional to create strategy for UM including students and staff)
- Cooper Commission- implementation phase



COOPER COMMISSION REPORT RECOMMENDATIONS

- Policy Development/Revisions (recommendations a, d, e and i)
- Academic program standards identification (recommendations b and c)
- Education/information and awareness development (recommendations f, g and h)



POLICY DEVELOPMENT/REVISIONS

- Adopt a standard set of definitions for terms related to accommodation
- Senate adopt a new or revised policy regarding accommodation that:
 - i. Reflects the right of students with disabilities to accommodation and to a fair, timely, respectful, and confidential process to reach accommodation decisions, as well as the right of the University to uphold high academic standards
 - ii. Includes provision for delegation of authority



POLICY DEVELOPMENT/REVISIONS (cont...)

- iii. Requires each Faculty/School to establish an Accessibility Advisory Committee
- iv. Sets out review mechanisms to resolve conflicts regarding accommodations within a Faculty/School
- Senate establish an Academic Accommodation Appeal Committee, a standing committee of Senate, whose role it will be to hear and decide upon appeals related to accommodation
- UM Accessibility Policy and Procedures be revised for clarity and specificity



ACADEMIC PROGRAM STANDARDS IDENTIFICATION

- Accredited & Professional Programs create essential skills and abilities documents for approval by Senate; the content congruent with the requirements of the accrediting and/or professional governing body
- Other Programs create written rationales for the bona fide academic requirements for approval by Senate, for all existing and proposed programs



EDUCATION/INFORMATION

- Education be provided (through Student Affairs and Fair Practices & Legal Affairs) on a regular basis to the University Community on:
 - the duty to provide reasonable accommodation
 - the procedures to be followed
- SAS to develop a web-based handbook for instructors on accommodating students
- SAS to provide information through an annual report to Senate and website on:
 - accommodations provided for categories of disabilities
 - evolving best practices



COOPER COMMISSION IMPLEMENTATION WORKING GROUP

- Created by Senate Executive in May 2012
- Co-chaired by Jeff Leclerc and Lynn Smith
- Mandated to develop a detailed plan to implement the Cooper Commission recommendations and create groups and delegate tasks to implement the recommendations
- Will study and use work done at other institutions
- Committee has met regularly since June, sub-groups are working and progress is underway
