REPORT OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON AWARDS

Preamble

Terms of reference for the Senate Committee on Awards include the following responsibility:

On behalf of Senate, to approve and inform Senate of all new offers and amended offers of awards that meet the published guidelines presented to Senate on November 3, 1999, and as thereafter amended by Senate. Where, in the opinion of the Committee, acceptance is recommended for new offers and amended offers which do not meet the published guidelines or which otherwise appear to be discriminatory under the policy on the *Non-Acceptance of Discriminatory Awards*, such offers shall be submitted to Senate for approval. (Senate, October 7, 2009)

Observations

At its meeting of December 11, 2014 the Senate Committee on Awards approved four new offers and four amended offers, as set out in Appendix A of the *Report of the Senate Committee on Awards* (dated December 11, 2014).

Recommendations

On behalf of Senate, the Senate Committee on Awards recommends that the Board of Governors approve five new offers and four amended offers, as set out in Appendix A of the *Report of the Senate Committee on Awards* (dated December 11, 2014). These award decisions comply with the published guidelines of November 3, 1999, and are reported to Senate for information.

SENATE COMMITTEE ON AWARDS

Appendix A December 11, 2014

1. NEW OFFERS

Department of Mathematics Graduate Fellowship

The Department of Mathematics at the University of Manitoba has established an annually funded fellowship to recognize graduate students who have achieved academic excellence in their Master's or doctoral program. Beginning in the 2015-2016 academic year, one or more fellowships, valued at up to \$10,000 each, will be offered to graduate students who:

- (1) are enrolled full-time in the Faculty of Graduate Studies in a Master's or doctoral program delivered by the Department of Mathematics at the University of Manitoba;
- (2) have achieved a minimum degree grade point average of 3.5 (or equivalent) in the last 24 credit hours of study;
- (3) have demonstrated academic excellence in the study of Mathematics.

To support criterion (3), candidates will be required to submit the following:

- (1) a cover letter (maximum 500 words) that describes the status and progress of the applicant's research program and course work;
- (2) a *curriculum vitae*;
- (3) an academic letter of reference from a university instructor.

The selection committee will have the discretion to determine the number and value of fellowships offered each year based on the available funds.

The Department of Mathematics will report the available funds to the Financial Aid and Awards office by March 31 each year.

The Vice-Provost (Graduate Education) and Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies (or designate) will ask the Chair of the Department of Mathematics' Graduate Studies Committee to name the selection committee for this award.

Dr. Harvey Spiegel Bursary

In memory of Dr. Harvey Spiegel, his family and friends have established an endowment fund at the University of Manitoba in 2014 with a gift of \$18,200. Dr. Harvey Spiegel graduated from the Faculty of Dentistry at the University of Manitoba in 1968. He was a caring and respected dentist and employer with a special interest in the performing arts. The Manitoba Scholarship and Bursary Initiative has made a contribution to the fund. The purpose of the fund is to provide financial support to a student in the College of Dentistry in the Faculty of Health Sciences. Beginning in the 2016-2017 academic year, the available annual income from the fund will be used to offer one bursary to an undergraduate student who:

- (1) is enrolled full-time (minimum 60% course load) in the third year of study in the College of Dentistry in the Faculty of Health Sciences at the University of Manitoba;
- (2) has achieved a minimum degree grade point average of 2.5;
- (3) has demonstrated financial need on the standard University of Manitoba bursary application form.

The selection committee will be the College of Dentistry Awards Committee.

The Board of Governors of the University of Manitoba has the right to modify the terms of this award if, because of changed conditions, it becomes necessary to do so. Such modification shall conform as closely as possible to the expressed intention of the donor in establishing the award.

Dr. Phil Katz Memorial Scholarship

Dr. Mark and Barbara Rykiss have established an annually funded scholarship in memory of friend and colleague, Dr. Phil Katz. Dr. Katz was a well-loved general dental practitioner who was kind, hardworking, and respectful of the dentistry profession. The purpose of the scholarship is to reward a student that exemplifies leadership and professionalism in the field of Dentistry. Each year, one scholarship valued at \$300 will be offered to an undergraduate student who:

- (1) is enrolled full-time (minimum 80% course load) in the third year of study in the College of Dentistry in the Faculty of Health Sciences at the University of Manitoba;
- (2) has achieved a minimum degree grade point average of 3.5;
- (3) exemplifies qualities of leadership and professionalism in the field of Dentistry.

Nominations will be invited from members of the class, faculty, support staff, and Class Advisors. The letter of nomination (maximum 250 words) should explain how the nominee meets criterion (3) above.

The donor will notify the Financial Awards Office by March 31 in any year the award will not be offered.

The selection committee will be named by the Dean of the College of Dentistry (or designate).

Regina Novek Prize

In memory of Regina Novek, Dr. Joel Novek has established an endowment fund at the University of Manitoba with an initial gift of \$10,000 in 2014. The purpose of the fund is to acknowledge a student who has produced an outstanding essay related to medicine and law. Beginning in the 2016-2017 academic year, the available annual interest from the fund will be used to offer one prize to a student who:

- (1) was enrolled either full-time or half-time in any year of study in the J.D. program offered by the Faculty of Law at the University of Manitoba in the year in which the prize was tenable;
- (2) has achieved a minimum degree grade point average of 3.0;
- (3) has submitted an original essay of 'A' quality or better related to medicine and law that is judged to be the submission of the highest quality.

The selection committee will be named by the Dean of the Faculty of Law (or designate).

The Board of Governors of the University of Manitoba has the right to modify the terms of this award if, because of changed conditions, it becomes necessary to do so. Such modification shall conform as closely as possible to the expressed intention of the donor in establishing the award.

2. AMENDMENTS

Geological Association Graduate Seminar Prize

The following amendments have been made to the terms of reference for the Geological Association Graduate Seminar Prize:

- The name of the award has been changed to the *Geological Association of Canada Graduate Seminar Prize*.
- The prize supports and encourages graduate students in preparation of scientific research and to aid in their attendance at the joint annual meeting of the Geological Association of Canada and the Mineralogical Association of Canada (GAC-MAC).
- The prize value has been increased from \$300 to \$500.
- The terms have been standardized and now include the following numbered criteria:

- (1) is enrolled full-time in the Faculty of Graduate Studies in a Masters or doctoral program delivered by the Department of Geological Sciences in the Clayton H. Riddell Faculty of Environment, Earth, and Resources;
- (2) has given a presentation as part of the graduate seminar series in the Department of Geological Sciences in the year the prize is awarded;
- (3) has submitted an abstract of their presentation to the GAC-MAC meeting in the year the prize is awarded;
- Selection based on criterion (3) has been expanded in the following paragraph, stating:
The student whose abstract is accepted by GAC-MAC and whose presentation is judged by the department's award committee to be of greatest merit will be awarded the Graduate Seminar Prize, on condition of also attending and presenting at the GAC-MAC meeting in the same year. A paper copy of the abstract of the winning student is to be provided to the Winnipeg Section of the Geological Association of Canada.
- The following two new statements have been added:
 - The donor will contact the Financial Aid and Awards office by no later than March 31 in any year this award will not be offered.
 - The Vice-Provost (Graduate Education) and Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies (or designate) will ask the Dean of the Clayton H. Riddell Faculty of Environment, Earth, and Resources (or designate) to name the selection committee for this award.

George Mower Memorial Prize

The following amendments have been made to the terms of reference for the George Mower Memorial Prize:

- The fund type has been listed in the preamble of the terms.
- The terms have been standardized and now include the following numbered criteria:
 - (1) *was enrolled full-time (minimum 80% course load) in the Department of Psychology in the Faculty of Arts at the University of Manitoba in the year in which the award was tenable;*
 - (2) *has achieved a minimum degree grade point average of 3.0;*
 - (3) *has obtained two A+ grades in two of the following courses within the last two years of study: Child Development (currently numbered PSYC 2290), Adolescent Development (currently numbered PSYC 3310), and Adult Development (currently numbered PSYC 3010).*
- The following statements have been added:
 - *The selection committee shall be named by the Head of the Department of Psychology (or designate).*
 - *The Board of Governors of the University of Manitoba has the right to modify the terms of this award if, because of changed conditions, it becomes necessary to do so. Such modification shall conform as closely as possible to the expressed intention of the donor in establishing the award.*

Technical Communication Report Prizes - Engineering

The following amendments have been made to the terms of reference for the Technical Communication Report Prizes - Engineering:

- The donor of the award has been changed to the Friends of Engineering

- The course name and number for which the prize is awarded has been updated.
- The maximum number of students per team has been included.
- The values of the prizes have been increased: up to a maximum of \$100 for each team member that has been awarded the first place prize and up to a maximum value of \$50 for each team member that has been awarded the second place prize.
- Professors for the course will forward 2-3 reports to the selection committee for consideration.
- The selection committee statement been revised to:

The selection committee will be named by the Scholarship, Bursaries, and Awards Committee for the Faculty of Engineering and will consist of the Faculty of Engineering professors for the ENG 2010 course, the Faculty of Engineering librarian, and a representative of the Friends of Engineering.

V.E. Barber Memorial Fellowship in Arctic Research

The following amendments have been made to the terms of reference for the V.E. Barber Memorial Fellowship in Arctic Research:

- The numbered criteria have been revised to:
 - (1) *are enrolled full-time in the Faculty of Graduate Studies, in a Masters or doctoral program and are supervised (or co-supervised) by a faculty member of the Clayton H. Riddell Faculty of Environment, Earth, and Resources;*
 - (2) *have achieved a minimum degree grade point average of 3.5 (or equivalent) based on the last 60 credit hours of study;*
 - (3) *are undertaking thesis research pertaining to the Arctic;*
 - (4) *have demonstrated outstanding leadership and/or excellence in Arctic research.*
- Two new statements have been added:
 - *If there are no suitable candidates, as deemed by the selection committee, the fellowship will not be awarded for that year.*
 - *A student may not hold this award more than once.*
- Candidates for the fellowship will be required to submit an application that will consist of a description of their ongoing research and their achievements in Arctic research, current academic transcript(s) and two academic letters of reference.
- The selection committee statement has been revised to:

The Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies (or designate) will ask the Chair of the Awards and Honours Committee of the Clayton H. Riddell Faculty of Environment, Earth, and Resources to convene the selection committee for this award.

Dear Dr. Barnard:

In accordance with the Student Discipline By-Law, I hereby submit the Annual Report of the University Discipline Committee (UDC) for the period September 1, 2013 to August 31, 2014. The attached Report on University Discipline cases summarizes all offenses and dispositions reported to me by all disciplinary authorities. I wish to thank all those offices who responded quickly to my request for submissions.

The UDC has continued to produce its report in chart format, and we have maintained the two major divisions, the first dealing with varying forms of "Academic Dishonesty" and the second addressing disciplinary matters which involve "Inappropriate Behaviour". Within each of the two major categories, like disciplinary matters have been grouped together for easier reference. Further, we have provided two graphs which offer a visual overview of disciplinary matters. The graphs span a five-year period.

I would make the following observations concerning the report's contents:

- 1) The information provided does not always convey the complexity of nature of the incidents and the resulting disciplinary action, particularly in the case of breach of residence hall regulations.
- 2) The overall numbers of incidents increased slightly in raw numbers this year in relation to last year and remained the same as a percentage of the student body. The numbers remain generally consistent in most categories compared to last year's results with the exception of:
 - a. increases in reported incidents of:
 - Part 1: Application Fraud;
Cheating on Mid-Term Tests; and
Plagiarism;
 - Part 2: Computer Related Incidents; and
Unprofessional Conduct
 - b. decreases in reported incidents of:

Part 2: Breach of Residence Hall Regulations

Upon receiving the reports from the disciplinary authorities, I checked with those who reported significant increases in incidents to see if they were cause for concern.

The increase in number of unprofessional conduct offences was the result of a new attendance policy being enforced. The increase in incidents of application fraud was due to increased training and awareness of staff. The increase in computer related incidents was due to a change in the residence wireless Internet policy. The increases in cheating on mid-term tests and plagiarism were due to small increases over a number of units and therefore not attributable to a specific disciplinary authority.







Student Accessibility Services

2013-2014 Annual Report

Mission

The University of Manitoba strives to ensure an accessible learning and working environment and is thereby committed to providing reasonable accommodation of the needs of persons with documented disabilities.¹ The University of Manitoba has a legal obligation to provide reasonable accommodations to students with disabilities who meet the academic requirements for the program to which they are admitted.

Student Accessibility Services (SAS) provides support and advocacy for students with disabilities, such as: hearing, injury-related, learning, mental health, medical, physical, visual or temporary disabilities. The unit acts as a liaison between students and the faculty and staff of the University of Manitoba as well as service agencies within the province of Manitoba. Accommodations and programs are offered to support students while they are at the University of Manitoba. All supports must be recommended and verified by a registered health professional. Student Accessibility Services offers support and accommodations based on a student's individual needs and the academic standards of the university program.

Introduction

This is the third annual report² from Student Accessibility Services providing information about the accommodations and services provided for registered students with disabilities at the University of Manitoba. This report provides statistics and activity highlights for the reporting period from May 1, 2013 – April 30, 2014.

This report is being submitted to Senate upon recommendation from the *ad hoc Committee of Senate Executive to Examine Accommodation of Students with Disabilities and Governance Procedures Related to Academic Requirements*.

Students

SAS works with many students who are successful in their academic and personal pursuits. One highlight of note (shared with permission from the individual) is Megan Jack, a Faculty of Medicine student who requires sign language interpreters, has completed her first year of the PGME Urban Family Medicine stream in Winnipeg.

Staff

The SAS team is made up of the following dedicated full time staff: Coordinator, Carolyn Christie; Accessibility Advisors Lisa Banash, Jamie Penner and Arlana Vадnais; Junior Accessibility Advisor, Sarah (Brown) Hiebert; Test/Exam Administrator, Charity Pascual; Test/Exam Assistant, Vanessa Ahing; and Assistive Technologist, Jeff Buhse. The unit reports through to Brandy Usick, Director, Student Advocacy and Accessibility.

Delivery of services and programs would not be possible without SAS's large number of committed part time staff including sign language interpreters, computerized and professional note-takers, academic attendants, and invigilators. SAS also relies on an enthusiastic group of volunteers.

In December 2013, Julie Bonneteau joined the team in the newly created position of shared office assistant for Student Advocacy and Student Accessibility Services. This coincided with SAS moving its reception from the Exam Centre in 155 University Centre to 520 University Centre. A renovation of the 520 University Centre reception space created a more welcoming and accessible environment for students. The Exam Centre benefitted too as traffic and noise levels decreased since the move.

Space

Physical Space

SAS operates out of three main office spaces: the SAS Exam Centre located at 155 University Centre; the advising offices located at 520 University Centre, (shared with Student Advocacy and the English Language Centre) and Services for Students at Bannatyne Campus located at T245 Basic Science Building. SAS also offers monthly office hours at the William Norrie Campus.

Online Space

As of May 2014, information about the accommodation needs of a student is sent through the *SAS online portal* via the University's JUMP system. Where applicable, this information is also sent via email to a Faculty Accommodation Team representative/liaison. The *SAS online portal* includes letters of accommodation, test booking and details, as well as volunteer note-taker systems. Highlights of the portal include:

- Faculty and students are able to access accommodation letters and send in test information through the JUMP portal, eliminating the need for hard copy.
- Volunteer note-takers post their notes to the portal.
- SAS students view potential note-takers and select the notes they prefer, which is a significant enhancement to the program.
- Students book tests online and instructors are notified via email when student(s) have booked, eliminating the need for hard copy.
- Instructors send instructions for tests and upload tests through the portal.

Key Features of Service Provision

SAS exists to support all students with disabilities to fully access their chosen course of study for which they are academically qualified. The majority of supports are provided through accommodations, such as extended time for exams. SAS also provides additional support to students by way of programming, which is described later in the report, and frequent referrals to other supports on campus (e.g. Student Counselling Centre, Academic Learning Centre, academic advisors etc.,)

SAS works with each student to apply for funding through the Canada Student Grant program. Staff work with outside funding agencies such as MarketAbilities, Vocational Rehabilitation, Workers Compensation Board, and Manitoba Public Insurance to request funding for student supports and equipment. Students remain eligible for SAS services in the absence of successful funding requests.

Demographics

95% of students registered with Student Accessibility Services have a permanent disability. The number of students who are registered with the SAS office increased from 994 in 2012-2013 to 1047 in 2013-2014. Please see Table 1.

The National Educational Association of Disabled Students (NEADS) estimates that 7% of students enrolled at a university have a disability³. The UM Office of Institutional Analysis data reported enrollment figures of 29,029 for 2013-2014⁴. This means that within the last academic year it is possible that 2032 students registered at the UM may have had a disability. Not all students with disabilities require or perceive a need to receive accommodations through SAS. A trend observed within the unit is that a student may not have perceived a need to access the office as an undergraduate but subsequently realizes the need to receive accommodations once entering a professional or graduate program.

Of the students who registered with SAS for the 2013-2014 year, 604 self-identified as female, 414 as male, and 29 who did not disclose gender or who represented a gender not fitting the two categories available. Self-identified students who have more than one disability represent 15% of the total students within the disability population registered with SAS.

Table 2 provides information on students registered with SAS according to disability type. The percentages in each category remain similar to those from the last two years, with cognitive disabilities and mental health disabilities remaining both our largest and most quickly growing groups.

In-person student meetings

Students must meet with an Accessibility Advisor to determine an individual accommodation plan for their academic program while registered at the UM. Follow up appointments are scheduled as necessary to complete funding paperwork, adjust accommodations, and to provide a ‘check-in’ and support for the student. Advisors provide in-person appointments, drop-in appointments, phone, and email support.

For the 2013-2014 year, SAS met 402 new students to the program. This means that 38% of all active students were new to the unit during the reporting year. Another trend we are noticing is students returning and requesting accommodations after no contact for one year. These students had been eligible for services but for various reasons chose to not receive them. It is estimated that there are 2000 students eligible (and registered) for services but not all are accessing them.

As part of their caseload, the Accessibility Advisors had 1,983 in-person student meetings. This number has decreased from 2,237 in 2012-2013. This trend is explained by an increase in email or telephone discussions rather than in person meetings.

Advising staff are available for in-person student meetings throughout the year at all UM campuses. SAS maintains regular office hours at Fort Garry, Bannatyne and the William Norrie campuses. For 2013-2014, in-person student meetings were at their highest in the month of September, followed by October, November, March and April. The fall term is traditionally busier for the advisors. The April appointment increase is surprising given the amount of time that advisors assist the SAS exam centre. Intake appointments were highest in the fall months, and again for March and April.

ad hoc Committee of Senate Executive to Examine Accommodations of Students with Disabilities and Governance Procedures Related to Academic Requirements” (Cooper Commission)

Carolyn Christie is a member of the “Cooper Commission” Implementation working group. Carolyn, Arlana Vadnais, Jamie Penner and Brandy Usick, along with Office of Legal Counsel, and Office of Human Rights and Conflict Management comprise a team of presenters for the “Duty to Accommodate” sessions, which were rolled out in the spring of 2014 and are continuing. SAS has posted a faculty handbook to its website which will serve as a valuable resource for the UM community. In addition, SAS has updated their website to include links to the “Cooper Commission” report, existing *Essential Skills and Technical Abilities* documents, and templates for Accommodation Teams and Accessibility Advisory Committees.

SAS has presented locally and nationally on the Cooper Commission: Greg Juliano and Brandy presented on “Reconciling Accommodation vs. Academic Standards” at the *Canadian Association for the Preventions of Discrimination and Harassment in Higher Education* conference held in Winnipeg, May 2014. Brandy and Carolyn co-presented *Accommodation Teams: Creating Opportunities For A More Effective Dialogue Between Disability Service Providers* the CACUSS conference held in Halifax, June 2014.

Accommodation Teams and Accessibility Advisory Committees

SAS is excited about the work of the Accommodation Teams and Accessibility Advisory Committees as well as the continued partnership with academic staff members. To date, the following faculties have in-progress or established accommodation teams:

Accommodations and Programs

Accommodations are designed to meet various needs posed by different disabilities. What is appropriate for one student may not be appropriate for another, since disabilities are as unique as the people who possess them.

There are three main types of accommodations:

(1) Test/Exam Accommodations: These are accommodations that pertain to the environment, format, and testing method for tests and exams.

(2) Classroom/Course-Related Accommodations: These are accommodations that pertain to the physical environment of the classroom, instructional strategies, and adaptations of the course materials and requirements.

(3) Campus Accommodations: These are accommodations that pertain to physical accessibility of and transportation on the campus.

SAS is proud to offer a wide range of accommodations and programs that match or exceed national standards. The following section provides information and statistics for each accommodation and program offered within SAS.

Test/Exam Invigilation

Many students with disabilities require unique accommodations when writing tests and exams. The total number of tests/exams invigilated in SAS for the reporting year was 5,060, up from 4,712 in 2012-2013. There has been an increase of 746 tests/exams in the last two years. Exams and tests written by students registered in programs offered at the Bannatyne campus were a large part of the increase as there were 224 exams hosted at that campus. The exam centre duties have been streamlined with the addition of the online scheduler as well the SAS reception duties moving to the 520 location to assist with the increase in workload. The request for test/exam service fluctuates with the academic cycle, with increases during mid-terms (October and February) and final exams (December and April). The Test Centre has 8 private spaces for invigilation of tests/exams. During midterms and final exam periods, SAS must book rooms across campuses and provide invigilators at up to eight locations. Due to the increase of exams and the lack of spaces, SAS has been stricter with its two week test/exam booking procedure this year. SAS has sent students bi-weekly email reminders to book exams and about the enforcement of the procedure.

Professional and Volunteer Note-taking

The SAS Professional Note-taking (PNT) program and Volunteer Note-taking program (VNT) have continued to grow. The Professional Note-taking program consists of paid note-takers, usually students, who take hand-written or typed notes for students who are unable to take their own notes. In 2013-2014 SAS had 23 PNT staff provide support to students who requested this service.

Volunteer Note-taking is a valuable service for students which could not continue without the support of instructors who recruit volunteers and the students who share notes for this program. In 2013-2014, there were 167 students (519 courses) requesting volunteer note-takers and 250 volunteers who provided notes for these courses. Volunteer note-takers can apply to have their co-curricular record reflect these volunteer hours. SAS has included volunteer note-taker sign up and note review to its online systems. During the summer session

2014, there was a 70% match rate for VNTs to students, a huge improvement over the D2L system.

Sign Language Interpretation

The Interpreting Program provides American Sign Language-English interpreting, as well as hand over hand signing, for students who are Deaf and Deaf-Blind. Services are provided for students in the classroom, for meetings with instructors or other students, for laboratory and tutorial sessions, and for other academic situations as needed.

For 2013-2014, SAS had 22 Interpreters working full time, part time and casually at the Fort Garry campus. In addition, the Interpreters provided supervision and mentorship to students enrolled in the American Sign Language-English Interpretation Program jointly offered by the University of Manitoba and Red River College. The team of four medical Sign Language Interpreters continue to work solely with a medical student. This program will be completed in Summer 2015.

Assistive/Adaptive Technology and Alternate format production

Student Accessibility Services continues to employ a complement of laptops with a number of adaptive programs, Kurzweil 3000 and Read & Write Gold (text to speech and study/organizational tools), Dragon Naturally Speaking/Dragon Dictate (speech to text), and JAWS and WindowEyes (screen readers, most often used by students with a visual impairment). As the computers age, technologies advance, and use by students for tests/exams and studying increases, more time is required by the Assistive Technologist, Jeff Buhse, to ensure the computers and programs continue to run smoothly. Jeff continues to provide expertise and support to the University of Manitoba’s Libraries Student Accessibility Services Implementation team and the accessible workstations available throughout the UM Libraries system. Jeff offers consultation and training sessions to faculty/staff and students for assistive technology and has seen an increase from 43 in 2012-2013 to 54 in 2013-2014. With the increase in computer use by students for studying and tests/exams, and with Jeff providing more supports and training, space is increasingly becoming a concern for this program.

SAS continues to see an increase in number of tests required in alternate formats for programs previously used as well as in formats not previously requested enough to track, i.e. braille and large print.

Due to the increase of requests for alternate format materials (PDF, Word, Braille, Large Print) and the administration duties required for this, SAS has been not been able to produce as much in-house, so most production of textbooks and course related materials is done by Alternate Format Resources (Manitoba Education, Province of Manitoba). However, the vast majority of test/exam materials are still taken care of in-house. Although not as dramatic as the increase from the previous year, we have still seen a more than 20% increase in requests for alternate formats (258 requests for 39 students in 2012-2013, up to 316 requests for 54 students in 2013-2014).

A task that moved to this portfolio this year was transcribing videos for students who are Deaf or hard of hearing. Transcriptions are required for any course content that does not include built-in captioning or have an available transcript. There were a total of 38 requests varying in length from a few minutes to several hours, including the transcription of one course on D2L which included several dozen lecture videos. Multiple different platforms have been required for transcription including VHS, DVD, YouTube, D2L, and other online sources. SAS will continue to remind faculty to use videos with built-in transcription to try to reduce the need for this service.

After several years of working with IST and TechnoPro, SAS has successfully implemented the use of our new online data management system, Clockwork. Clockwork allows for student and instructor access to all pertinent information that is up to date via the secure link within JUMP. In addition to a more positive user experience, Clockwork provides more security for the sensitive information and virtually eliminates the need for any SAS manual data entry which will prevent entry errors and greatly decrease the time required of SAS exam and volunteer note-taking staff.

Bannatyne campus

SAS has one advisor whose focus is on the academic programs offered at the Bannatyne campus. This advisor maintains office hours at the Bannatyne campus one day a week and attends the majority of the Accommodation Team and/or Accessibility Advisory Committee meetings. The Test Assistant had part-time hours at Bannatyne campus to assist with the increase in bookings. The Coordinator is available for meetings as needed, and travels to support the medical interpreting team if needed. SAS works out of the Services for Students at Bannatyne Campus offices and with the support of that office, hosts the majority of tests and exams in the T Wing Basic Science Building.

Coaching

The Coaching program assists students to better manage aspects of their life that interfere with their academic program. A coach supports, encourages, advises and confronts while providing opportunities for skill development. The unit's certified Coach is Lisa Banash. She works with students one-on-one for in-person and telephone coaching sessions. Students receive 10 coaching sessions for the term on a fee-for-service basis. There continues to be a wait list for this program. As of December 2014, the certified coach has left the program. SAS will continue to search for a replacement.

Academic Attendant/Research Assistant

During the 2013-2014 reporting year, seven students used the Academic Attendant program for a total of 1,645 hours. Seven attendants were hired to work with the students. The program offers on-campus, in-class assistance for students struggling with professor-student interaction, group-work and in-class presentations, note-taking, organizational study assistance, lecture reviews, and interaction with university staff. Canadian postsecondary institutions are offering innovative programs to support students with Asperger Disorder or Autistic Spectrum Disorder and the University of Manitoba is seen as a leader in this regard with the Academic Attendant program.

The Research Assistant program is designed to offer assistance in areas of research that students are unable to do alone. This involves creating Braille documents, formatting printed articles, library research, and other physical tasks students with disabilities may not be able to accomplish without aid. There were 4 students and 4 staff involved in the program this year.

Tutoring

SAS assists students in applying for tutoring funding and helps them to use the UMSU registry. This continues to be an issue as many students who do not qualify for funding would benefit greatly from a tutor, and cannot pay on their own.

Staff Accommodations

SAS provides assistance in the coordinating some accommodations for staff given its specialized services. These accommodations include training on assistive technology, interpreting services and note-taking services.

Educational Outreach

- SAS staff held Disability Awareness workshops for several groups on campus, including Peers, Student Advisors, Residence staff, instructors, New Faculty orientation, Libraries, and Human Resources.
- SAS held one Faculty Advisory Committee meeting.
- SAS co-presented for 5 “Duty to Accommodate” presentations.
- Staff attended several committees including the: Cooper Commission working group, Mental Health strategy working group, Health and Wellness Advisory Committee, RESPECT coalition, Student Affairs Assessment Working Group, and Student Affairs Communications Committee.
- Carolyn Christie (SAS) and Eunice Friesen at the Centre for Advancement of Teaching and Learning (CATL) co-facilitated a three-day institute for instructors, “Reaching all Learners”, showcasing universal design principles and excellent teaching practices.
- Jeff Buhse presented at CATL’s institute, “Your D2L course. Simplified”, on accessible formats for online teaching.

- Carolyn Christie (SAS) and Eunice Friesen and Dr. Amy De Jaeger (CATL) were approved for the TLEF grant, titled, “Beyond Abilities”, to study the patterns and reasons of student appointments and the potential connection to classroom communication issues.
- Staff attended the IDI Intercultural Development Training from the International Centre for Students.
- Lisa Banash received her coaching certification and attended CISAS.
- Arlana Vadnais completed her Mental Health First Aid and received Instructor Certification
- Jamie Penner was a panel presenter at the 2013 NEADS conference in Winnipeg.
- All staff facilitated Access Awareness Day 2014 including community group tables, and a week long, “Celebrating Abilities” Art Gallery.
- The Campus Accessibility Committee met semi-annually.
- Jeff attended CSUN 29th Annual International Technology and Persons with Disabilities Conference
- Bi-weekly emails were circulated to SAS students with information about important topics such as scholarships, test booking dates, research recruitment and UM events.

Community Outreach

- SAS staff maintained contact with various disability organizations including the Canadian Paraplegic Association, Canadian Mental Health Association, Manitoba MarketAbilities, Employment Equity Committee, Society for Manitobans with Disabilities, Canadian Institute for the Blind, Canadian Centre on Disability Studies, and the Manitoba Deaf Association.
- Jamie Penner continues to be a board member for Asperger Manitoba.
- Arlana Vadnais became a board member for Anxiety Disorders Association of Manitoba.
- Jeff Buhse is a member of the Libraries Student Accessibility Implementation Team.
- Jamie Penner and Arlana Vadnais met with one Russian and two Ukraine delegations through the Canadian Centre on Disability Studies to discuss post-secondary supports.
- Jamie Penner and Jeff Buhse presented to the Speech Pathologists for the Manitoba Department of Education.
- SAS underwent a PHIA audit to ensure the systems were in compliance with legislation.

Trends

The *Accessibility for Manitobans Act (AMA)* was enacted on December 3, 2013 with consultations for the first standard, *Customer Service*, held throughout the year. The SAS Coordinator met with the Human Rights and Conflict Management office, Human Resources, and other universities and colleges in Manitoba to discuss planning for the “*Customer Service*” standard, which will be presented in early 2015. Further, the second standard to be reviewed will likely be “*Information and Technology*”. SAS continues to work with our campus partners to provide information and resources on accessible media, technology and alternate formats. The majority of this information is available on the SAS website.

Summary

SAS is proud that the recommendations arising from the “*ad hoc Committee of Senate Executive to Examine Accommodations of Students with Disabilities and Governance Procedures Related to Academic Requirements*” (Cooper Commission) have been largely completed. The Unit is looking forward to the changes arising from the AMA and assisting the UM community.

SAS thanks students, faculty, staff and the University of Manitoba community for their continued support and assistance.

Student Advocacy

2013-2014 Annual Report

Student Advocacy Mission Statement

The mission of the Student Advocacy office is to ensure that students are treated fairly in their dealings with the University. The Student Advocacy office is dedicated to educating the University community concerning student rights and responsibilities and assisting students in the resolution of conflicts arising from actions or decisions taken by the University. While serving the University, Student Advocates maintain a student focus by providing information; investigating complaints; resolving conflict through alternative and formal systems; representing students at hearings; and reviewing policies and recommending change.

This report provides selected data and highlights of the Student Advocacy office activities for the reporting period from September 1, 2013 to August 31, 2014.

Staff

Full time staff during 2013-2014 were Brandy Usick (Director), Brian Barth, Heather Morris, and Ali Wood-Warren (Student Advocates) and Angel Therrien (Assistant to the Director). Julie Bonneteau joined the team in December 2013 in the newly created position of shared office assistant for Student Advocacy and Student Accessibility Services, which coincided with renovation of the 520 reception space. Susanna Ally worked as a Junior Student Advocate in Summer 2014 after Brian Barth left to pursue a position in a different office. Sarah Degagne and Kamille Legaspi were our work-study students, and Josh Philion-Brager was our Peer Advocate placement student from *Peers: Students Helping Students*. Student Advocacy maintains office hours at the Fort Garry and Bannatyne campuses. Advocates are also able to meet students at other affiliated campuses on an as-needed basis. The office provides services to current, former, and prospective University of Manitoba students.

Contacts

In 2013-2014, the Student Advocacy office received a total of 2,157 requests for assistance by students, staff, and faculty. Student contacts lead to the creation of an individual student case or are categorized as 'general student contacts' (inquiries, potential cases, online chat, cancellations/no shows). Individual student cases that continue past the end of the last reporting year are carried forward into the next. Faculty and staff who contact the office for assistance are identified as consultations. Table 1 provides a comparison of office contacts between the current and the last four reporting years, which shows that the demand for services have remained stable or have increased.

Demographics

Of the 983 students for whom an individual student case file was opened, 52% were female and 48% were male, and approximately 28% self-identified as international students. Most students were enrolled in Science (21%) followed by Arts (17%), Graduate Studies (13%) and University 1 (12%). These four faculties, which have the largest number of enrolled students overall, have traditionally comprised the largest proportion of students who contact our office.

Students completing undergraduate programs at the Bannatyne campus comprised approximately 3.5% (n = 35) of the caseload. For this report, the faculties included in our statistics from the Bannatyne Campus refer to the faculties in place prior to the July 1, 2014 amalgamation for the new Faculty of Health Sciences. It is also important to note regarding our numbers for Bannatyne students, that the office currently does not distinguish between graduate programs offered between Fort Garry and Bannatyne campuses. Therefore, there will be some graduate students from Bannatyne campus not accounted for in this statistic. Although this number is small, the presenting issues tend to be complicated in nature and require a significant amount of an Advocate's time.

The office continues to receive a high number of referrals; 63% of students indicated they were referred to Student Advocacy for assistance either by another office on campus, or through our website or other outreach activities.

Students of Concern

Student Advocacy is often involved with providing assistance and support to students who may be of concern, including students whose behaviour may be considered as threatening to self or others, or who may be vulnerable or at risk given their present circumstances. Such cases tend to require an exceptional amount of individual support and appointment time from the Advocates compared to other student cases. As well, the complexity of the cases usually requires coordination with other offices (e.g. Student Counselling Centre, Student Accessibility Services) or referral to other units for specific types of support (e.g. Financial Aid and Awards office, International Centre for Students, Student Support Case Manager).

¹ In the reporting years 2010-2011 and earlier, "issue cases" were identified separately from individual student cases. For ease of comparison, these issues (2 in 2010-2011 and 3 in the 2009-2010 reporting years) were added to the individual case statistic.


Since the 2012-2013, we have begun to track the number of students of concern and the number of appointments related to these students in particular. Due to the complexity of these cases, student involvement with Student Advocacy may last several months or students may be active for some months but not others. As a result, it is difficult to identify an exact number of individual ‘students of concern’, we identified 61 new ‘students of concern’ (up from 32 last year). However, it is important to note that some of these students’ issues carried on over several months. The Advocates had 124 appointments and/or meetings with ‘students of concern’ over this reporting year. The Director is often consulted by members of the university community regarding student matters and this statistic is reflected within the faculty/staff consultations reported in Table 1. Separate from that number are several consults she had related to 15 ‘students of concern’.

These statistics may be helpful for three reasons: 1) to help quantify staffing resources being used to support ‘students of concern’ within Student Advocacy; 2) to share statistical information with the newly hired Student Support Case Manager to help her in her role; and 3) to contribute to an understanding of institutional trends that will help support the newly developed mental health strategy.

Categorization of Issues

In 2013-2014, the Advocates assisted students with a total of 1,137 issues. Note that students may bring forward more than one issue within a reporting year, thus the numbers of individual student cases and issues differ. Figure 1 provides a breakdown of how issues are categorized, and the proportion of issues that fall under the respective categories. This distribution is similar to the previous reporting year².

Figure 1. Categorization of Issues



² In 2012-2013 the breakdown of issues by category was Academic (55%), Discipline (29%), Administrative (12%), RWLE (2%), Admissions (2%).

Each category is explained below and in some instances, further broken down into subcategories.

Academic issues are further sub-categorized: **special requests** (68%) e.g., authorized withdrawals, deferred examinations, term work extensions, or leaves of absences; **complaints** (20%) e.g., grade appeals, conflict with instructor or graduate advisor; **academic deficiency** (10%) i.e., not meeting minimum academic performance requirements; and **professional conduct** (2%) i.e., professional unsuitability or debarment. These ratios are similar to previous years, with a slight increase in *special requests* and *complaints*, and slight decreases in *academic deficiency* and *professional conduct* sub-categories.

Discipline issues are divided into two categories: academic discipline, which refers to issues of academic dishonesty (see Table 2a) and non-academic discipline, which refers to issues of student misconduct (see Table 3).

To assist with comparison between the Student Advocacy annual report and the University Discipline Committee (UDC) report, beginning in 2012-2013 we re-named some categories to match with the names of similar categories in the UDC report. We also provide a more detailed breakdown of issues under our category of “Cheating” (see Table 2b) to try and match as closely as possible with the UDC categories of “Cheating –mid-term tests”, “Copying from another student or own previous work” and “Contravention of examination regulations”.

Academic discipline issues appear to be steadily increasing, particularly for those behaviors that constitute plagiarism.

Table 3 includes our statistics for *non-academic discipline* issues. There was an increase in the category of “other”. The main issues comprising this statistic are students who had violated the FIPPA/PHIA policy or had a campus ban (due to violent or threatening behaviour) that was either being imposed or the student was requesting to have ban lifted.

The remaining issue categories are Administrative (9%), Admission (2%), and Respectful Work and Learning Environment (formerly “Equity”) (2%). The *Administrative* category includes matters that involve an administrative office. Examples include tuition fee appeals and transcript notation removal requests submitted through the Registrar’s Office. The *Admission* category involves requests for reconsideration or appeals of denied entry to a prospective faculty or program. *Respectful Work and Learning Environment (RWLE)* issues involve referral to or coordination with the Human Rights and Advisory Services office. In the reporting year, there were a total of 21 students whose issues fell under this category. Nineteen (19) students wished to make a complaint (informal or formal) and one student was identified as a ‘respondent’ to a complaint. There was one student assisted who was both a complainant and a respondent.

Resolution of Issues

In 2013-2014, the majority of the issues were resolved informally, which is the Office’s preferred avenue of resolution (see Table 4). Of the issues resolved within a “Formal” process (submission of a request or appeal and appearance before an appeals or standings committee), 49% were granted in favour of the student; 6% were given modified outcomes; 28% were denied; 3% of appeals were not heard by a committee; and 14% had decisions pending as of August 31, 2014. Issues closed as “Other” involve situations wherein a student retains a lawyer, the advocate withdraws services, or a student withdraws his/her appeal after it is submitted (the latter comprises the large majority of these types of resolutions).

Table 5 provides a summary of meetings and hearings attended by the advocates. The total number of meetings is similar to last year; however, there were fewer academic meetings and more discipline meetings attended compared to the previous year. Mainly this is attributed to the increase in academic discipline issues that involve a preliminary investigation meeting with a student and the disciplinary authority. There was a slight increase in the number of hearings the Advocates attended compared to last year.

Educational Activities

An important mandate of the Office is education and outreach. In 2013-2014 the staff prepared and delivered a total of 88 presentations and workshops. This represents an increase to the number of presentations and workshops offered compared to last year (63). We have had an increase in requests for sessions from individual courses, departments, and faculties. Staff members were invited to speak at student orientations and were asked, throughout the year, to present in classes or to groups of students on student rights and responsibilities, avoiding academic dishonesty, or student conduct. In addition to presenting at orientation sessions for new faculty and administrators, staff also offered workshops on the student discipline process, disruptive students, and academic integrity.

Academic Integrity Promotion

Student Advocacy’s Integrity Week took place September 30-October 4, 2013 and several events were held, including an information booth in both University Centre and in the Brodie Atrium at the Bannatyne Campus. The Academic Integrity Ambassadors (AIA) and UMSU developed an academic integrity trivia game played in the Fireplace Lounge in University Centre. We partnered with the Academic Learning Centre’s Writing Tutors in Dafoe Library, also involving a trivia game. In collaboration with ICS, a workshop was presented to international

students. Heather Morris and Brandy Usick prepared an article for CATL's *Path to Pedagogy* publication on preliminary highlights of the 2012 online academic integrity survey. Through these various outreach activities, Student Advocacy Office staff and the AIAs were able to interact with several hundred students.

Academic Integrity Ambassadors (AIA) Program – this was the fourth year the Student Advocacy Office has offered this leadership opportunity for students interested in promoting academic integrity on campus. Ali Wood-Warren oversaw five ambassadors who volunteered during the 2013-2014 academic year: Laryssa Bogucki, Matthew Sanscartier, Timi Ojo, Ainsley Chan, and Yining Wang. The AIA program was also able to offer a placement for the Peers: Student Helping Students program; Trinda Penniston was placed as an AIA Program Assistant. The volunteers assisted with Academic Integrity Week and other educational initiatives, including development and facilitation of presentations to student groups. For the first time in the program's history, volunteers were given the opportunity to shadow the work of the advocates with a student discipline allegation through to its outcome. This was reported as an invaluable experience and furthered the ability of the volunteers to educate their fellow students on the topic of academic integrity.

Committee Work

During the reporting year Brandy Usick co-chaired university-wide working groups on Academic Integrity, Cooper Commission Implementation, and Child Care. Heather Morris was the Student Affairs representative on the Peers: SHS Steering Committee and attended meetings of the International Student Advisors Network. Ali Wood-Warren attended meetings of the U of M Advisor Exchange and New Student Orientation Committee. Brian Barth attended meetings of the Writing Tutor Advisory Group. Brandy Usick and Heather Morris attended the Student Affairs Assessment Working Group and participated in the newly formed Sexual Assault Working Group.

External Committee Work

Student Conduct and Academic Integrity Association (SCAIA)- Brandy Usick is the central representative for SCAIA, a division of our national organization CACUSS, and chaired a small working group on academic integrity (AI). Highlights included hosting a national teleconference on AI and an AI roundtable at the CACUSS conference in Halifax in June, 2014.

Scholarly Activities

Heather Morris and Ali Wood-Warren successfully presented on the Academic Integrity Ambassadors program at the *International Centre for Academic Integrity Conference* held in Jacksonville, Florida on February 27-March 2. They also attended the first Canadian Consortium held at ICAI. Brandy was interviewed by Holly Moore of CBC for a national story on academic dishonesty that aired on CBC TV/radio/web on February 25th and 26th. Brian Barth and Brandy Usick presented on "Graduate Student/Advisor Relationship: Preventing and responding to personal harassment from the perspective of a student support office" at the *Canadian Association for the Preventions of Discrimination and Harassment in Higher Education* annual conference held in Winnipeg. Brandy Usick and Heather Morris co-taught the *Role of the Student and Student Needs*, a three-week online course through CHERD.

Recommendations

The Student Advocacy office would like to offer the following recommendation for consideration and to provide updates on past recommendations:

University Discipline Committee annual report- UPDATE to last year's recommendation

Last year we had recommended "To work with the office of the University Secretary to facilitate a consistent method of data collection and categorization of issues under the existing Student Discipline By-Law categories for "Academic Dishonesty". We are pleased to note that the Academic Integrity Working Group is working to prepare definitions for various examples of academic dishonesty. We believe that this process will help create consistency to help in meeting the above recommendation.

Social media education- UPDATE to last year's recommendation

Last year we had recommended- "That the University enhance educational initiatives related to informing students about appropriate use of social media as a member of the University community." A new working group has been formed on "Digital Identity", co-chaired by Karen Meelker, Access and Privacy Officer, and Brendan Hughes, Executive Director, Student Engagement. The aim is to create university-wide educational opportunities for students and staff regarding proper use of social media including management of online personas.

Discipline Matters

Student Advocacy recognizes the challenges for new administrators in their role as a disciplinary authority, which requires them to respond to allegations of student misconduct. Likewise we appreciate that newly appointed chairs and members of local discipline committees may not receive sufficient training before participating in a disciplinary hearing. To help ensure fairness of the process for both the University and for the students involved, we respectfully recommend that new administrators and new chairs and members of discipline committees receive 'Fair investigation' and/or 'Fair Hearing' training. This training has been developed in partnership with the Office of Legal Counsel.

2. The Committee considered summaries of eleven graduate program reviews including: Agribusiness and Agricultural Economics; Economics; Education (Ph.D.); English, Film, and Theatre; Entomology; Food Science; Pharmacy; Philosophy; Plant Science; Religion (Ph.D.); Soil Science.

Undergraduate Program Reviews

3. The Committee received for its consideration, a Report on the Status of Current Undergraduate Program Reviews Summaries of Undergraduate Program Reviews. Seventeen reviews are either underway or have been initiated, as set out in the attached report. One review recently concluded is under review in the faculty.
4. The Committee considered summaries of three undergraduate program reviews, including Classics; Economics, and English, Film, and Theatre.

Externally Accredited Programs

5. The Committee received, for consideration, a Report on the Status of Externally Accredited Programs (attached).
6. The Committee was informed that a number of programs in the Faculty of Agricultural and Food Sciences, which were previously included in the Report on the Status of Externally Accredited Programs, had been removed from the Report. The accreditation period had expired and the Agricultural Institute of Canada, which is the accrediting body, is not currently conducting accreditation reviews.



a. **Name of the Group:** Geopolitical Economy Research Group

b. **Description and Justification**

i. **Mission and Objectives**

The Geopolitical Economy Research Group will be an influential policy research Group. It will conduct high quality research into, and analysis of, national economies, their relation to the world economy and the political management of both. It will propose and critically analyse policy alternatives for managing the interaction of national economies and states to promote human development and mutual benefit in today's multipolar world.

ii. **Relation to the University's Mission and Strategic Research Plan**

The Group will further the University's mission 'to create, preserve and communicate knowledge, and thereby, contribute to the cultural, social and economic well-being of the people of Manitoba, Canada and the world'. It will be in keeping with the University's aim to be 'among the best of Canada's universities'.

It will also promote the University's strategic research goal of being recognized as a leader among Canadian research-intensive universities in that it will 'enhance capacity in existing areas of research strength; build research capacity in emerging areas of research strength; foster networking, partnerships and collaborations between disciplines and across sectors; and provide unique research training opportunities for graduate students and other trainees including undergraduate students'.

While, among the six major thrusts identified in the University's Strategic Research Plan, the Group fits best under 'human rights and social justice' and, given its emphasis on human development, under 'culture and creativity', it will also prioritize issues of sustainability and northern communities and public health.

iii. **Rationale:**

Retrospective

The proposed Geopolitical Economy Research Group emerges from, and seeks to further, the work of a dense network of research collaboration. It can only be very briefly and partially outlined here.

The University of Manitoba boasts a vibrant circle of academics, particularly from the departments of History, Economics, Sociology, Anthropology, Labour Studies and Native Studies, and through the collaborative and interdisciplinary programme, Global Political Economy who are all interested in political economy and international political economy. Its interactions have driven the research of its individual members and includes the recent publication of *Geopolitical Economy: After US Hegemony, Globalization and Empire* which breaks the theoretical ground for the conception of the proposed IGE. The present proposal builds this record of extensive collaboration between proposed members

of the research group at UM. The proposal for the establishment of the Geopolitical Economy Research Group also builds on research collaborations between University of Manitoba scholars and scholars beyond the University of Manitoba.

c. Constitution

i. Organization and Structure

The Geopolitical Economy Research Group will have a Director with primary responsibility for running the Group and its programmes. He/she will be advised on broad policy issues by an International Advisory Council consisting of between 5 and 11 respected scholars nominated for a renewable 3-year term each. They will be members of the Group. The initial nominations will be made by the Director. Their renewals and/or replacements will be the joint decision of the Advisory Committee. In the day to day work of the Group, the Director will be assisted by four Associate Directors. Associate directors will be nominated by the Director and confirmed by the International Advisory Council. They will be drawn from among relevant UM faculty and the wider community. Each will be appointed for a renewable three-year term and will be responsible for one of the following discrete sets of tasks:

1. UM Liaisons: liaising with other units at the UM to facilitate collaborations in research, teaching and student experience enhancement
2. International Liaisons: liaising scholars and other research institutes around the world to create the international network around the Group
3. Budget Management and Fundraising
4. Community Relations: liaising with the community and media in Canada and elsewhere.

Together they will constitute an Executive of 5 individuals. As resources become available, the Executive will be assisted by a paid Executive Director or Administrative Assistant whose work will include assisting the Director and the Executive in writing grant applications to raise external funding. The Executive will rely on advice and input from an International Advisory Council consisting of leading intellectuals from around the world.

ii. Categories of Membership

The Group aims to have a broad membership among both individuals and institutions who are in agreement with its principles as listed above. There will be three kinds of Individual Membership:

- Faculty: Faculty members and post-doctoral fellows with appointments at Canadian or international universities and/or research institutes with a demonstrated interest in the subjects under the purview of the Group;
- Student members who are studying at a Canadian or international university with a demonstrated interest in the subjects under the purview of the Group may become members through application or invitation; and
- Community members who are adults with a demonstrated interest in the subjects under the purview of the Group may also become members through invitation or application. Institutional Membership will be open to university-based, governmental, community-based as well as independent research and media organizations around the world which produce as well as disseminate innovative and accurate analyses of

various aspects of the evolving world order and whose activities conform to the purposes of the Group.

New members will be vetted by a membership committee struck by the Director from among the original membership.

iii. Procedures for appointment of Members

Membership can be conferred through invitation as well as application. Invitations will be extended to individuals and Institutions who, in the view of the Director, will help further the Group's objectives. The Director will take the advice of the Associate Directors from time to time in extending invitations. Applications for Membership can be made through the Group's website. They will be adjudicated by the Director, with help from the Associate Directors, according to the extent to which the applicant, individual or institute, will aid in the furtherance of the Group's objectives.

iv. Privileges and Responsibility of Membership

Membership will confer the following benefits:

- Opportunity to undertake and organize individual or collaborative research on a small or large scale under the rubric of the institute,
- Access to funding from said research as resources become available
- Use of resources created by the Group;
- Access to regular updates of the Group's activities through a newsletter,
- Priority tickets for attendance at its conferences, seminars and public lectures and
- Privileged access to its website.

Membership will carry the responsibility of members to contribute to the Group's work through their own research and/or publicising it through their activities.

Other Benefits and Privileges may be added as the work of the Group develops.

A Membership Fee may be levied as a way of generating core funding or financing particular aspects of its activities.

Membership may be revoked by a disciplinary committee consisting of the Director or his or her designate and two members of the International Advisory Council in case of serious professional misconduct.

d. Management

The Group's Director will be Radhika Desai.

It is proposed that the name of the Bachelor of Medical Rehabilitation (Respiratory Therapy) be changed to Bachelor of Respiratory Therapy.

Background

The Respiratory Therapy Program became a Department within the School of Medical Rehabilitation in 2003. Since that time the credential offered through the department is the Bachelor of Medical Rehabilitation – Respiratory Therapy. At that time all of the credentials offered within the school had names that reflected both the School and the name of field of study. Since 2013 the only credential name that includes reference to the School is the respiratory therapy program credential.

On October 8, 2013 the University of Manitoba Board of Governors approved the proposal to create a Faculty of Health Sciences with colleges of Dentistry, Medical Rehabilitation, Medicine, Nursing and Pharmacy. On April 22, 2014 the Board of Governors of the University of Manitoba approved the motion to change the name of the School of Medical Rehabilitation to the College of Rehabilitation Sciences effective upon the formal implementation of the Faculty of Health Sciences.

Rational for the Proposal


With the implementation of the new Faculty of Health Sciences and the College of Rehabilitation Sciences, inclusion of the term Medical Rehabilitation in the name of the degree will no longer be reflective of the name of the unit in which the program of studies takes place.

Currently the other credentials offered in the programs within the School of Medical Rehabilitation/College of Rehabilitation Sciences are the Master of Occupational Therapy (MOT), the Master of Physical Therapy (MPT) and the MSc Rehabilitation. These credential names refer directly to the field of study and health profession to which the programs relate. Changing the respiratory therapy credential to Bachelor of Respiratory Therapy (BRT) better aligns the credential name with that of other credentials of entry to practice health professional programs within the College and elsewhere in the Faculty (e.g. BN, MD, MPAS)

This new name is considered to be a better representation of the program of study and the way in which the discipline is referred to by its regulatory body (the Manitoba Association of Registered Respiratory Therapists) and by health care agencies where respiratory therapy is practiced. Re: Endowed Professorship in Neurosciences

Dr. Brian Postl, Vice-Provost and Dean of the Faculty of Health Sciences, has provided a letter of support for the proposal to establish an endowed professorship in Neurosciences Research. This professorship aligns with strengths in the College of Medicine Program and the Department of Anesthesia.

The policy on Chairs and Professorships specifies that:

- (1) the professorship be established consistent with the academic goals and objectives of the University;
- (2) the professorship be partially funded from external sources outside of the University operating funds, and that the funds normally must be sufficient to cover 20% of the salary and benefits of the incumbent and provide for an appropriate level of unrestricted research/scholarly support;
- (3) the funds for the professorship be provided by way of an endowment or through a schedule of annual expendable gifts for a defined period of not less than five years, or by an appropriate combination of endowment and annual expendable gifts;
- (4) the professorship shall be attached to a department, faculty, school, college, centre or institute of the University, and have goals consistent with the unit to which it is attached;
- (5) the establishment of the professorship is not tied to the appointment of a particular individual;
- (6) individuals appointed to the professorship normally shall have the academic qualifications commensurate with an appointment at the rank of Professor, Associate, or Assistant; and
- (7) the initial term of the appointment of the professorship shall be 3-5 years, and if renewal is permitted, such renewal shall be subject to a successful performance review and the availability of funds.

The proposed professorship in Neurosciences Research satisfies all of the above requirements. The proposal provides for the possibility of the appointment of an individual at the rank of Associate Professor or Professor. The initial appointment will be for a three-year period with the possibility for renewal. Funding will be derived from a \$1,000,000 endowment fund held at WHRA-Health Sciences Centre. The interest earned will be gifted to the University annually and used to fund the Professorship.

I am in support of the proposal from the Faculty of Health Sciences and request that you present it to the Senate Committee on University Research for consideration and recommendation to Senate and then to the Board of Governors.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

In accordance with the policies and procedures for establishing Chairs Professorships at the University of Manitoba, the following is being presented:

TYPE OF APPOINTMENT: Professorship

NAME OF PROFESSORSHIP: Professorship in Neurosciences

PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVE OF THE PROFESSORSHIP:

The purpose and objective of the Professorship shall be to provide leadership, scholarship and mentorship in neurosciences. The Professorship will support research in the identification of new methods and techniques for diagnosing, treating and prognosticating patients with severe brain trauma injuries. The ultimate goal is to seek methods to improve patient outcome and functionality, while reducing recovery times. Specific objectives include:

- To contribute significantly to the body of scholarship in neurosciences related to traumatic brain injury.
- To create an opportunity to recruit/retain an experienced leader with demonstrated expertise in a relevant area.
- To create the opportunity to recruit/retain an experienced leader with demonstrated expertise in neurosciences and a proven track record in related research. The support of this Professorship would afford such an individual with the time and necessary support to fully devote his/her efforts to achieve the proscribed objectives.
- The expectation is that the recipient will devote at least 20% of their time to the research activities of the Professorship.
- A condition of the awarding of the Professorship is that the recipient will be engaged in clinically relevant area(s) of neurosciences research with clearly defined outcomes and potential for translation in the area of traumatic brain injuries. The research may be in any of a range of relevant topics consistent with the intent of the Professorship in Neuroscience.

RELATIONSHIP TO THE PROPOSING UNIT

The individual who is awarded the professorship will be appointed in the unit of Neuro-Anesthesia within the Department of Anesthesia in the Faculty of Medicine. The recipient must be a member of the scientific or medical staff at the Health Sciences Centre. It is expected that the primary site of research will normally be at the Health Sciences Centre campus.

The proposed professorship will enhance research expertise in areas relevant to the identification of new methods and techniques for diagnosing, treating and prognosticating patients with severe brain trauma injuries. Implicit in this will be the mentorship of new investigators in this area of research within the Department. The professorship will expand the overall research profile of the Department of Anesthesia and the Faculty of Medicine.

THE METHOD BY WHICH THE PROFESSORSHIP WILL BE FUNDED

The professorship will be funded by the annual interest from a \$1,000,000 endowment fund held at the Health Sciences Foundation. On an annual basis, the Health Sciences Centre Foundation will donate the income generated from the endowment fund held by their organization to the University of Manitoba. This annual discernment amount will be in accordance with the University of Manitoba's current policies on endowment funds and will cover at least 20% of the University of Manitoba salary and benefits as well as potentially provide research support, as stipulated in the Policy and Procedures for establishing Chairs and Professorships.

GENERAL AND SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS FOR THE PROFESSORSHIP:

In accordance with the Policies and Procedures for establishing Chairs and Professorships at the University of Manitoba, individuals appointed to the Professorship shall have the following qualifications:

- Recipient must hold an MD or PhD degree in a relevant discipline;
- Holding a current academic appointment at the rank of Associate Professor or Professor.
- History of excellence in research as evidenced by a strong publication record in high impact journals and acquisition of national or international peer reviewed grants and contracts.
- History of excellence in mentoring trainees and junior colleagues.

TERM OF APPOINTMENT:

- The initial term of the appointment will be three years, the biennial and final year progress reports.
- There will be a mandatory internal midterm evaluation with the intent of:
 - Assessing research progress
 - Identifying emerging needs or opportunities related to the Professorship.
- The renewal of the appointment for an additional term(s) will be subject to a successful review of the incumbent's performance within the context of the College of Medicine's research strategy, such a review to be carried out during the second year of the term.

A successful performance review will provide evidence of the following:

- Personal research productivity in the form of external grants, presentations, and peer-reviewed publications. Funding from one or more national agencies would be expected along with additional funding from local sources.
- Evidence of mentorship including having one or more full-time research trainees or clinical fellows in their research year.
- Evidence of publication productivity indicated by 1-2 publications/year with 1 or more in high quality journals.
- Evidence of, collaboration and multi-disciplinary research within the University and between the University and other research institutions.
- Appointee to the Professorship will give a public lecture within the first year of their appointment.
- The appointee to the Professorship will report annually on their activities relevant to the Professorship. This report will include, but not limited to:
 - A general accounting of how the previous payment was utilized;

- A general summary of all unpublished findings of the studies conducted under the Program; and
- Proposed future plans, next steps and goals of the Program.

OTHER PROVISIONS:

- 1) The selection and appointment of an individual to the proposed Professorship shall be conducted in accordance with section 2.3 of University Policy on Chairs and Professorships.
- 2) The duties and responsibilities of the individual appointed to the proposed Professorship will be in accordance with 2.4 of University Policy on Chairs and Professorships.
- 3) Annual reporting requirements shall also be in accordance with the University Policy on Chairs and Professorships. In addition to the reporting requirements stipulated in this policy, the Professorship holder shall provide an annual report of activities to the President of the University. In turn, the President shall provide a copy of said report to individuals or organizations that have contributed to the establishment of the Professorship, and that have specifically requested this information.
- 4) The holder of the Professorship will have an appointment in a department within the College of Medicine and some restricted clinical activity to ensure a clinical profile. Cross appointment to an appropriate basic science department may also be considered. The Professorship holder is expected to participate in teaching activities, which may include teaching of undergraduate and post-graduate medical trainees and graduate students, and provision of mentorship for research trainees working under his/her supervision.
- 5) The role of the Professor will be to contribute significantly to the body of research and scholarship in the College of Medicine and the Faculty of Health Sciences, Accordingly, the appointment of the Professor will be made on the recommendation of the College of Medicine and shall be conducted in accordance with the University policy in Academic Appointments and the guidelines for the establishment of Professorships.
- 6) It is understood that the Professorship will be structured with a three year maximum term with an option of renewal subject to satisfactory performance by the incumbent, but also with the understanding that the research focus could be changed at intervals according to the changing needs of the department in which the Professorship is held, as determined by the Head of that department and the Dean of the College of Medicine and subject to approval by the University of Manitoba.


