WELCOME TO THE INDIGENOUS CAREER MENTOR PROGRAM!

Taanshi, boozhoo, welcome to the Indigenous Career Mentor Program! The Indigenous Career Mentor Program (ICMP) is a new program commencing September 2022. It sits alongside, and is a branch of the Career Mentor Program (CMP), which was developed in 1990 through a partnership between the University of Manitoba Counselling Service and the Alumni Association. Both the ICMP and CMP offer students the opportunity to connect with professionals through informational interviews. A student using the program will be matched with a mentor in their field of interest and conduct an hour-long interview to gather industry information and receive career advice and guidance from a mentor.

WHY DO STUDENTS PARTICIPATE?

Students in the Indigenous Career Mentor Program may have a personal career trajectory mapped out to include the type of occupation they are interested in pursuing. They have opted to see a mentor in a preferred industry area (see categories highlighted below) and may have questions about that field. Students may also have questions specifically about navigating their career as an indigenous professional. They may also be wondering about how to enhance their employability and be looking for advice about how to build valuable skills and industry exposure. Some may be hoping to develop a network or learn about labour market conditions.

There is a wide range of information and insight a student might be seeking. We invite you to share your experiences and career journey as an indigenous professional, while highlighting the skills required to succeed in your industry. The personal and professional insights you provide can have a significant impact on the journey of a student.

Industry areas of student interest:

(Students select one of these areas of interest when signing up for the program and we match them with mentors accordingly)

- Business & Administration (e.g. Finance, Human Resources, Logistics);
- Health Care (e.g. Medicine, Nursing, Rehabilitation Sciences);
- Social Services & Education (e.g. Social Work, Teaching, Counselling);
- Government Services (e.g. Municipal, Provincial, Federal policy, programming or administration);
- Science & Technology (e.g. Biotechnology, IT, Engineering);
- Arts & Culture (e.g. Film, Visual Arts, Library Sciences); and
- Recreation & Sport (e.g. Fitness Training, Recreation Programming).

STUDENT PREPARATION

Before meeting with a mentor, students attend an orientation session to identify their career values and start developing questions for mentors. Feel free to view a list of sample questions.

STUDENT-MENTOR MATCHING

We match students with mentors based on industry interest. We use our confidential database of mentors to identify a mentor for a student. The ICMP is a new program, starting in fall 2022, and we are continuing to seek mentors from a wide variety of industries, and from diverse educational backgrounds and experiences. Please note that our program is confidential, and your personal information is not distributed to other organizations.

THE INFORMATIONAL INTERVIEW

Meetings with students are approximately **1 hour** and can occur virtually (phone, video conference) or in-person. In-person meetings at your workplace allow the student to experience the dynamics of the industry setting. Mentors can also meet with students at the University or an alternate location. TIPS TO HELP YOU AS A CAREER MENTOR

- Feel free to share your experiences. Be encouraging, positive, and realistic.
- If appropriate, offer a workplace tour.
- If you think a student would benefit from meeting with someone else, please refer them.
- Never feel that you should offer a job or volunteer placement. Do offer advice on where students might gain valuable experience.
- Do not feel obligated to spend more than an hour with a student or to meet on an ongoing basis.

- If possible, indicate that you may be available in the future if the student has additional questions. You may also offer a job shadow if that is of interest to you and feasible within your organization.
- Please refer the student to us for occupational information and post-secondary program options.
