## CALL FOR APPLICATIONS

**Columbia University**, Dept. of History seeks talented undergraduate & graduate students for its 2012 seminar on the *History and Future of Religious Violence and Apocalyptic Movements*. The 10 week seminar will run from May 29-August 2 at Columbia in New York City. It starts with 2 weeks of 'total immersion' training on global religious violence, then 7 weeks to conduct research and collaborate on team projects, and then the last week allows students to present their research and participate in a crisis simulation exercise. Participants also write an article-length paper based on their summer research. This credit course is the equivalent value of 2 semester-long courses at Columbia. ## CALLS FOR PAPERS

The **International Conference on the Inclusive Museum** will be at the University of the West Indies, Cave Hill, Barbados from August 2-5, 2012. Conference organizers ask, "At this time of fundamental social change, what is the role of the museum, both as a creature of that change, and perhaps also as an agent of change?" Museum practitioners, researchers, thinkers and teachers can engage in a discussion on the historic character and future shape of the museum. The plenary speakers will be Lonnie Bunch, Founding Director of the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History & Culture; Alissandra Cummins, Director of the Barbados Museums and Historical Society, and Jose do Nascimento Jr. President of the Brazilian Institute of Museums. The conference will include paper, workshop and colloquium presentations. Presenters may choose to submit written papers for publication in the *International Journal of the Inclusive Museum*. The **Canadian Committee on Public History** invites nominations for a Public History Prize to be awarded at the AGM of the Canadian Historical Association in Waterloo. The award will recognize work that achieves high standards of original research, scholarship, and presentation; brings innovative public history contribution to its audience; and serves as a model for future work, advancing the field of public history in Canada. Nominations are encouraged on the nature and evolution of public history; the workings of memory, commemoration, and their application in public life; archival practice and policy; museum studies; and the presence of historical events and themes in society. Works (books, exhibitions and/or exhibition catalogues, documentary films, websites, etc.) in public history completed in 2011 are eligible for consideration.
