CALLS FOR PAPERS

The **Canadian Polish Research Institute** at Cape Breton University is hosting an Interdisciplinary Conference in Sydney, NS, July 25-28, 2013. Organizers seek proposals on the theme “*Between Past and Future: Culture, Heritage, and Community Development of Polonia in Towns and Small Cities.*” Some questions that might be examined include: How important is language retention? How are new immigrants welcomed by older or native-born settlers from the same ethnic community? What ensures the survival of some organizations and the disappearance of others? How have Polish traditions and customs changed over time? How have Poles and non-Poles recorded and remembered the history of Polonia? How do the Polonia experiences resemble or differ from those of other ethnic communities? And how is the Canadian experience different from its counterparts in the U.S. and Britain, etc.? Established and emerging scholars in many disciplines (including history) are asked to submit proposals for individual papers, full panels, and round table discussions.
