The **Annual International Wanapitei Aboriginal History and Politics Colloquium “International Perspectives on Indigenous History and Politics: The United Nations Declaration and Beyond,”** will be held at Lake Temagami, ON, Sept. 23-26. The colloquium’s focus will be on multidisciplinary topics related to the history, present state, and future of Indigenous peoples globally. Presenters are encouraged to offer papers within the main focus of the colloquium or on related themes. The Colloquia are informal and highly participatory gatherings of people from a wide spectrum of backgrounds, including Elders, university faculty and graduate students, professionals associated with consultancy firms and First Nations Organizations, and staff of federal and provincial government departments. Send abstracts for papers and sessions by **June 21**. The event is held at the Wanapitei Chateau, a wilderness lodge associated with a camp and a CANOE organization on Lake Temagami. Riel’s Defence is a conference devoted to Louis Riel’s speeches in his trial for high treason, 1885 at the University of Windsor from October 28-30. The conference will consider Riel’s speeches from a number of perspectives including the historical, the political, and the rhetorical. The conference aims not only to draw attention to these speeches as a rich resource for study in themselves but also to add to our understanding of Riel and the circumstances of his trial. The **Historical and Global Perspectives on Provincial and Local/regional Parks in Canada** symposium will be held at the University of Saskatchewan on Oct. 29 & 30. The organizers seek to: elucidate

the intersections of provincial, local, and national park histories within a global context; communicate the continuities and discontinuities between the parks creators’ intentions and lived reality of parks; and to illustrate any hegemonic cultural assumptions that lie behind parks and the impact these have for indigenous people and recent immigrants who may or may not share the assumptions of mainstream society. The call for papers particularly encourages applications that place Canadian provincial and local parks within the context of transnational comparisons, and those that account for long-term ecological change. The symposia is for faculty and students as well as people outside of academia working in such areas as park administration or public history. Interested individuals should send a (maximum) 300 word abstract (include the author’s names, affiliations, and paper title) and a one-page CV to: Keith Carlson, keith.carlson@usask.ca. ‘We Demand’: History/Sex/Activism in Canada is a conference to mark the 40th anniversary of gay and lesbian activists’ action on Parliament Hill demanding that the federal government bring an end to laws and practices that criminalized, marginalized, and stigmatized lesbians and gays. The conference, held August 25-28, 2011 in Vancouver, seeks to showcase current work on all aspects of the history of sexuality in Canada, from pre-contact to present times. Organizers are currently accepting proposals for panels, individual papers, roundtable discussions, and poster sessions. Submissions are sought from scholars, archivists, educators, public historians, and past and present political activists from all sexual fronts. Panel and roundtable submissions should include a session title, a brief description of the panel or roundtable, abstracts for each paper (no more than 250 words) and a brief CV for each presenter and for the session chair.
