To **Terry Cook** who has been elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada. The formal RSC citation reads as follows: "Terry Cook has transformed archives from being perceived as storehouses of old records to sites of power worthy of scholarly attention. In rethinking appraisal to decide what records become archives, responding to the challenges of digital records and critical theory and exploring archival history, Cook has developed, nationally and internationally, a distinctive voice for Canadian archival scholarship."

STUDENT POSTER COMPETITION

The UM Office of the Vice-President (Research) requests proposals for its annual undergraduate student research poster competition. The competition will be on Friday, November 5 from 1-4:30 pm in University Centre. Students can present the results of an undergraduate honours thesis completed in the previous academic year, or present the results of a summer 2010 research project, or present an original research/scholarly project completed in an undergrad course. Prizes of \$500 & \$250 will be awarded to the top 2 posters in each of the 5 categories: applied sciences, health sciences, natural sciences, social sciences/humanities, and creative works. The judging criteria includes: scholarly/scientific/creative content; appropriate use of images, graphics, and/or tables; appropriateness of headings, clear objects & conclusions; overall impression and significance; and communication to the audience through written or visual language. This is an opportunity for members of the university community and public to see the relevance, value, and outstanding calibre of research done by young researchers at the University of Manitoba. Thompson Rivers University Philosophy, History, and Politics Conference will be held January 13-15, 2011 in Kamloops, BC. This undergraduate conference seeks submissions of proposals for papers and panels on any aspect of Canadian small cities. Students who would like their paper to be considered for a Community-University Research Alliance (CURA) panel should state so in their proposal. Papers should be 20 minutes in length. Abstracts of approximately 350 words **must be submitted by November 26** and must include name, affiliation, and contact details. For panels provide a title and individual abstracts for each paper. CALL FOR PARTICIPANTS

"Teaching History in Diverse Venues: A Workshop Linking Historians and Educators in Bettering History Education Practice," Thursday, November 4, 2010, Toronto. This one-day workshop will bring together graduate students and faculty from History, Education, and related disciplines, together with practicing teachers and public history professionals, to discuss new directions in teaching history within diverse venues, including public school and university classrooms, museums and historic sites, and virtual locations. The event will include a morning plenary speaker Christopher Dummitt, History, Trent University, speaking on "After Inclusiveness: The Future of Canadian History," a provocative critique of the tendency towards ever-greater inclusiveness in the writing and teaching of Canadian history, and a call to widen the scope of debate in the discipline. An afternoon field trip to nearby Claireville Conservation Area will take these debates into the field to discuss practices in experiential education and their efficacy in engaging students in the study of history. Funding is available to cover travel and accommodation expenses for participants outside the Toronto area. RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP AWARD
