Objectives of the course:

This course examines the social processes involved in becoming and being mentally ill. Topics such as gender and mental disorder, images of madness, and decision-making rules in the psy-professions will be considered.

Required text:

Busfield, Joan. Men, Women and Madness: Understanding Gender and Mental Disorder, New York University Press, New York: 1996.

Course requirements:

The final grade for the course will be based on three (3) equally weighted requirements:

- 1) In-class test (1/3 of final grade): Thursday, February 11/05
- 2) Group assignment (1/3 of final grade): due Thursday, March 24/05
- 3) Take home exam (1/3 of final grade): due April 19/05 by 4:30 pm.

Study questions for the in-class test and take home exam will be distributed in advance. The group assignment will be detailed in a separate handout. **Late submissions will be penalized 5 points per day including weekends.**

Students are expected to attend class and to complete the readings in advance of the lectures so that any problems, concerns or issues can be raised for discussion in class. Participation in class discussion is both welcomed and encouraged.

January 6: Introduction and overview of the course

January 11 – February 9:

The first section of the course examines issues that are critical to a Sociology of Mental Disorder including the role of social factors in the construction and 'diagnosis' of mental illness, the methods used to study mental disorders and the social control of deviance.

February 22 – April 12:

The second section of the course engages a focused analysis of the various accounts of the origins of mental disorder, including for example, biological explanations, feminist psychologies and socio-political processes. These attempts to 'explain' mental disorder will be scrutinized in relation to the regulation of normality.
