COURSE OVERVIEW:

Criminal law and its procedure will introduce you to the criminal process. First, we will consider how the “system” of criminal law works. The reality of justice and manner rendered in our criminal courts will be exposed for our examination and criticism. Emphasis will be placed on individual rights, their protection under law and most notably under the Charter of Rights and Freedoms. Once you have a background of knowledge respecting the way an accused comes before Court, we will contemplate the proof of guilt at Trial. This is “substantive” criminal law. It is concerned with defining the rights and duties each person has in a society, it defines criminal conduct.

APPEAL OF MID-TERM & TERM WORK ASSESSMENTS:

A student who wishes to appeal a grade given for a piece of term work is normally allowed 10 working days (from date of communication of the grade) to make such an appeal, which is to be done as follows:

1. The student is expected to discuss matters relating to the grade with the instructor prior to submitting a formal, ie., written appeal.
2. Having decided to submit a formal appeal, the student is to obtain the necessary “Application for Appealing a Grade Given for Term Work” form from the General Office of Sociology, complete it, take it to The University of Manitoba Comptroller’s Office and pay the required fee.

MISSED EXAMINATIONS & LATE ASSIGNMENTS:

If a test is missed for a legitimate medical reason the student **MUST** get in touch with the professor, present a medical certificate, and arrange for a make-up test. Under normal circumstances, the student is required to inform the professor of a request for a make-up test within one week of the original test date. Failure to request a make-up test within the expected time frame may result in ineligibility for a make-up test and a mark of zero for that test. No make-up will be allowed after the mid-term examination has been returned or taken up in class. One mark per day will be deducted for late submission of the assignment. No assignment will be accepted after the return of the marked assignments and the student will receive a zero for the assignment.
