**Course Objectives**

The goals of this course are to introduce students to the ‘sociological imagination’ and to demonstrate how it helps us to understand ourselves and the wider social world of which we are a part. We will examine some central theoretical perspectives, sociological methods, and concepts to demonstrate the ever changing relationship between the individual and society. Throughout the course special emphasis will be placed on asking students to think critically about Canadian society, its institutions and even about everyday taken for granted situations.

**Tests**

Four in-class tests will be given throughout the year. Tests will consist of multiple choice and short answer questions drawn from lectures, assigned chapters from the textbook, films shown in class and any handouts provided by the instructor. Test dates are listed under the course schedule. Students must be aware that missing a test will result in a grade of zero except under restricted circumstances. If a student is unable to take a test due to illness, the student must notify the instructor as soon as possible, present a signed medical certificate and arrange for a make-up test. Make-up tests *may* be granted for disability or compassionate reasons, at the full discretion of the instructor.
