SOC 2510 Criminology (A01 CRN:30121)

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Objectives of the course:

This course provides an introduction to the field of Criminology. Among the issues to be addressed in the first part of the course are the origins of Criminology; the place and practice of law in society, the study of crime and criminal conduct and the contribution of feminism to the discipline. This will be followed by a critical examination of theories of crime and three major patterns of criminal behaviour.

Required texts:

Linden, R. Criminology: A Canadian Perspective. (7th edition), Nelson Education, Toronto: 2009.

*Additional readings may be assigned throughout the course.

Course requirements:

The final grade for the course will be based on the following:

- 1) Attendance (10%): one point deduction for each missed class.
- 2) In-class group exercises (20%):

- 2) In-class Test (30%): Friday, May 4, 2012
- 3) In-class Test (20%): Monday, May 14, 2012
- 4) In-class test (20%): Wednesday, May 23, 2012

The course requirements will be based on the readings, lectures and class discussions. Students are expected to attend class and to complete the readings in advance of the lectures so that any problems, concerns or issues can be raised for discussion in class. Participation in class discussion is both welcomed and encouraged. In-class tests will be comprised of multiple choice and true/false items.

Make-up tests and missed group exercises will not be considered unless appropriate documentation has been received. Requests for special consideration must be made well in advance. It is the student's responsibility to notify the instructor within 24 hours of a missed requirement or test. Neglecting to do so will result in a grade of zero for that requirement.

Requirements for the group exercises will be detailed in class. **Mark your calendars for May 10: Justice in a Post Bill C-10 World (A Public Learning Forum).** The second in-class group exercise will be based on this learning forum.

The first section of the course examines preliminary considerations that are critical to the field of Criminology. This includes the origins of Criminology, the place and practice of law in society and the study of crime and criminal conduct.

Readings: Linden, Criminology: chapters 1 - 5 inclusive.

Friday, May 4: In-class test (30% of final grade)**May 7 - 11:**

The second section of the course engages a focused analysis of theories of crime beginning with an examination of the feminist critique of and contribution to new directions in criminological theory, research and practice.

Readings: Linden, Criminology: chapter 6 - 10 inclusive.
