PLEASE READ THE COURSE OUTLINE CAREFULLY

CONTENT AND PURPOSES:

This course provides an introduction to the study of society and to the discipline of Sociology. It is designed as a survey of the field and will examine the theoretical perspectives that inform sociological inquiry, research methods as well as the social institutions, relations and practices that make social life possible and intelligible.

REQUIRED TEXTS:

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

The final grade for the course will be based on FIVE (5) equally weighted in-class term tests and a take home assignment which have been scheduled as follows:

- 1) Term test 1 (15%): October 15, 2009
- 2) Term test 2 (15%): November 26, 2009
- 3) Term test 3 (15%): January 28, 2010
- 4) Term test 4 (15%): March 4, 2010
- 5) Term test 5 (15%): April 8, 2010
- 6) Take home assignment (25%): due in-class January 12, 2010.

The in-class term tests will be based on readings and lectures and will involve multiple choice and true/false items. The take home assignment will be detailed in a handout.

Please note that the above schedule will be strictly adhered to and no provisions have been made for make-up tests or late submissions of the take home assignment. Requests for special consideration must be made well in advance and/or supported by appropriate documentation. If a make-up test or time extension is approved, students must comply with the time/date scheduled by the instructor. **It is the student's responsibility to contact the Instructor to report a missed test within one week.**
