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Course Description/Objectives

Following the lead of the text, we will examine “how the social structure and culture of society contribute to social problems and their consequences” (p. xiii). We will learn to recognize that solutions cannot be effective if we don't fully understand the causes of a problem and acknowledge that our ultimate goal is not to solve any or all of society's problems in a few weeks. As such, we will learn to appreciate differing points of view.
