


Admission Requirements

All applicants must meet:

1. General Entrance Requirements

Manitoba high school graduation (5 full credits at the Grade 12 level in courses designated S, G, or U)



2. Program specific admission requirements

4 program specific approved academic 40S courses including a Math 40S and English 40S course

- All requirements are outlined in the 2023 Viewbook and on the website (Direct entry admission requirement PDF)

Admission Requirement Reminders

- University 1 is the back up option for all Direct Entry programs
- Minimum averages and minimum course grades will vary by program
- The minimum average does not guarantee admission
- The fifth course used for meeting the General Admission requirements can be any 40 S, G, or U level course





English Proficiency Waiver

- Manitoba high school graduation with ONE credit of English at the 40S level with an average grade of 75%
- Successful completion of a 3-year secondary school program in Canada immediately prior to attending the University of Manitoba (min 5 credits per year)
- Ten consecutive years of residency in Canada that may include years of study in Canada
- Some countries are exempt from providing English language proficiency


- Students need a business degree to work in business. | Fact: Employment requirements vary for roles in Business, Admin & Finance and grads from all disciplines enter this field.


