Childcare in Manitoba



Childcare in plays a vital role in supporting families and nurturing the next generation.

Manitoba has a variety of early learning and childcare programs designed to promote healthy development, education, and socialization for young children.



Types of childcare programs

- Full-time or part-time or drop-in care
- Non-profit and private programs
- Centres, home daycares, Montessori schools, nursery schools, and Head Start Programs
- Different programs provide care to children ranging between the ages of 3 months to 12 years of age
- There are also other types of care available for children with special needs (respite care, day programs)



Childcare grouped by age

- Infant care is from 3 months to 2 years
- Toddler care is from 2 to 3 years of age
- Preschool care is 3 to 6 years of age
- Kindergarten care can start on the year the child turns 5 years old by Dec. 31 (which is when they are eligible to attend kindergarten in schools)
- School-age care are for children between the ages of 6 to 12 years
- There are programs around the city for those who are 13 years and older.
 These are no longer considered childcare and are referred to as teen or youth programs.



- Kindergarten classes in schools are considered optional. Children have the right to attend school the year they turn 6 years old (Gr. 1).
- Some schools offer kindergarten per period (morning or afternoon) every day or all-day on alternating days (M/W/F or Tu/Th)
- Before & after school childcare programs offer care before school starts and after school ends; most provide care during in-service days and school breaks
 - In-service Days are when schools closed so that educators can attend Professional Development opportunities
 - School breaks occur in December (winter), March/April (spring), and July/August (summer)



Staff supervision

- Licensed programs are inspected by the Government of Manitoba
- There are regulations that programs must meet to maintain their operating license
- There are two different staff classifications for those who are trained in the childcare field: Early Childhood Educators (ECEs) and Child Care Assistants (CCAs)
- For licensed centres and home daycares, there are minimum staff to child ratios set in place (according to age groups)



Childcare costs

- Licensed programs charge a fee of \$10 per day
- Some programs may charge additional fees for providing snacks or lunches
- For-profit programs and home daycares charge more than \$10 a day and the fees can vary
- All families that pay for childcare receive a government tax credit during income tax filing season



Childcare subsidy

- The \$10-a-day parent fees pertain to families who are enrolled in licensed, non-profit centres and home daycares that receive provincial operating grant funding.
- There is no application process.
- Child care subsidy is available to families to meet the eligibility requirements. Some eligibility factors taken into consideration include: household income, number of children, age of children, days requiring care, and reason for care. Childcare on campus

- The Campus Children's Centre is a non-profit childcare organization located at the Fort Garry campus. They will soon be expanding to a second location at the Bannatyne campus with a target opening date of early 2026. They prioritize children of students, staff, and faculty of the UM community. www.campuschildrenscentre.com/
- Both the Family Resource Coordinator as well as the Family Centre Coordinator can assist with the childcare search process. We are not able to guarantee a space, but we can certainly help you navigate through the process.



Childcare wait times

- While there are many centres and programs around the city, there
 is a waiting period to get into your preferred program
- The average wait times vary
- Most programs have a waitlist
- The private, for-profit programs or home daycares usually have shorter waitlists



Rady Student Parent Study Program


- Rady Kids' Club, a safe and nurturing environment for children of students studying on the Bannatyne campus
