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RECTOR'S MESSAGE

As Rector of St. Paul's College, I am pleased to present our Annual Report for the 2023-2024 academic year.

It is safe to say that our student numbers, which were drastically reduced during the pandemic and soon after, are now again on the rise.

This report provides an overview of our most recent year here at the College. Here are some highlights worth noting:

- In 2023-24, 843 University of Manitoba students joined St. Paul's College, an increase from 762 in 2021-22. We expect to continue building on our successes!
- With 149 student members graduating in the past year with their university degrees. To celebrate, we held a Baccalaureate Celebration on Sunday, April 28th, with a highly successful breakfast hosted by the Ignatian Society, followed by Mass and a special ceremony.
- Our student members were enrolled in a wide range of University of Manitoba degree programs. This includes 24% in the Sciences, 19% in the Arts and Humanities, and 13% in Business. Many other students were enrolled in University One, Law, Medicine and Health Sciences, Engineering, Music, Education, and Peace and Conflict Studies.
- Our Catholic Studies B.A. minor program continues to be the largest of its kind in Canada. A total of 352 University of Manitoba students enrolled in courses provided by the Jesuit Centre for Catholic Studies. We thank the University of Manitoba for their continued support for this program through the 10-Year Jesuit Academic Funding Agreement.
- The Joint MA with the University of Winnipeg and PhD program in Peace and Conflict Studies are thriving programs housed in the Arthur V. Mauro Institute for Peace and Justice. Each year we have around 50 PhD and 50 Masters students studying in the UM PACS program here in the College. A majority of these students come from all parts of the world. Over \$100,000 in awards were provided to these students through the St. Paul's College Foundation.
- Our faculty continues to be drawn from a wide range of University of Manitoba departments, including fulltime faculty, associate members, research fellows and visiting scholars.



In creating this report, our College acknowledges the tremendous support from the University of Manitoba's Office of Institutional Analysis and the Registrar's Office, with special thanks to Wen Trask and Jessica Katz. We also appreciate the hard work of Cory Cameron who prepared and edited the report, while also managing its design, layout and print production. A big thanks also goes to those who helped proofread the various drafts prior to finalization.

We deeply appreciate the support we receive from our generous donors, alumni, volunteers, the Archdiocese of Winnipeg, the University of Manitoba, and others across the broader community. We also appreciate all the good things our students, faculty and staff do each day to make this a great community within the larger University of Manitoba community!

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

STUDENT MEMBERSHIP

- A total of 843 University of Manitoba students registered as members of St. Paul's College as recorded November 1, 2023.
- In 2023, 149 student members of St. Paul's College graduated from the University of Manitoba. 29 students graduated at the Fall Convocation and 120 students graduated at the Spring Convocation.
- In 2023, 631 of the eligible 802 student members, or 78.70% of students returning to the University of Manitoba in the 2023-24 academic year continued as College members.
- In the 2023-2024 regular academic year, the majority of St. Paul's College students were enrolled in Science (24%), Arts (19%) and Business (13%).

AREA OF EMPHASIS

- The PhD Program in Peace and Conflict Studies is now in its fifteen year of implementation. In 2023-24, there were eight graduate course sections of Peace and Conflict Studies.
- The University of Manitoba's BA (Minor) in Catholic Studies has existed for more than 22 years and is the largest program of its kind in Canada. In 2023-24 there were seven sections of CATH 1190 (including summer 2022) and five upper-year courses offered. Total enrollment was 327 students.
- Campus Ministry welcomed Fr. Wajira Nampet, S.J. from Japan into their Chapel Community.
- St. Paul's College also welcomed Ms. Krista Wiebe, our new Comptroller
- This year St. Paul's College hosted the public Way of the Cross on Good Friday, March 29, 2024, in partnership with the Office of Youth and Young Adults of the Archdiocese of Winnipeg.
- On August 4, 2023, our good friend and generous supporter, Dr. Arthur V. Mauro, passed away.

FACULTY MEMBERSHIP

As of February 2024 St. Paul's College faculty membership included:

- Sixteen individuals hold regular membership status at St. Paul's College.
- Seven individuals hold associate membership status at St. Paul's College.
- Eight individuals hold research fellow status at St. Paul's College.
- Three senior scholars.
- Nine honorary members.
- Five visiting scholars.


CHART 1: ST. PAUL'S COLLEGE STUDENT MEMBERSHIP (2019–2023 | AT NOVEMBER 1, 2023)



CHART 3: STUDENT MEMBERSHIP DISTRIBUTION (2022–2023)



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


I am a Paulinian - Kiara Calista

Research Fellow: one who may or may not hold an appointment at the University of Manitoba, but is a scholar who can contribute to St. Paul's College research and academic programs, and has been appointed by the Board of Governors as a Research Fellow.

Senior Scholar: one who holds an appointment of Senior Scholar at the University of Manitoba.

Support Staff: the Assembly Constitution states that one representative from the Support Staff shall be a member of the Assembly as selected by the Support staff.

Emeritus Member: one who holds an appointment of professor Emeritus or Librarian Emeritus at the University of Manitoba; and who has been approved by the St. Paul's College Board of Governors for life upon nomination of the Academic Affairs Committee and election by the Assembly.

Honourary Member: one whom the Assembly wishes to recognize as a distinguished contributor to the church, country or to the College and University life in general, but who receives no emoluments and has no share in College governance as a result of Honourary membership.

Visiting Member: one who is engaged in teaching and/or research, and who holds a temporary or part-time appointment at St. Paul's College and/or the University, or who is nominated to membership in the Assembly for reasons deemed appropriate by the Assembly.

35TH WAY OF THE CROSS AT ST. PAUL'S COLLEGE

On Good Friday, March 29, 2024, St. Paul's College at the University of Manitoba hosted the 35th annual Way of the Cross in partnership with the Office of Youth and Young Adults of the Archdiocese of Winnipeg. This event is a significant expression of faith, marking Jesus Christ's final journey to his crucifixion.

"The 35th Annual Public Way of the Cross was a great event that brought together so many people from our College Community and the Archdiocese of Winnipeg," said Myles Cesario, Campus Ministry Assistant and Event Organizer. "It was so touching to see both young and old pray and reflect on Jesus' last moments on Earth, a truly inspiring pilgrimage."

The day began at Christ the King Chapel where hundreds of worshippers were gathering at the first station. Archbishop Richard Gagnon led the procession, carrying the symbolic wooden cross. Approximately 2,000 people joined as the procession moved through the campus, stopping at various stations depicting stages of Jesus' journey. Participants engaged in prayer, reflection, and hymns that guided the procession from station to station, concluding at Christ the King Chapel for the final station.

"We were very honoured to be chosen to host this important Good Friday event at St. Paul's College at the University of Manitoba," stated Dr. Christopher J. Adams, the Rector of St. Paul's College. "It was a moving experience for our students and all those who came from across the City of Winnipeg."

This year, technology-enhanced the inclusivity and accessibility of the Way of the Cross. Opening and closing

prayers were live-streamed on the St. Paul's College Facebook page, and digital programs allowed participants to follow along on their phones. These efforts ensured broader community participation while maintaining the event's traditions.

"It was inspiring and uplifting to see so many people of faith, of different ages and backgrounds, manifest their faith publicly and lovingly in the procession of the Public Way of the Cross.," Archbishop Richard Gagnon of the Archdiocese of Winnipeg. "It was an important public witness to what Holy Week is about."

On August 4, 2023, our good friend and generous supporter, Dr. Arthur V. Mauro, passed away. He was a good and faithful man.

Arthur arrived in 1946 from Port Arthur, Ontario (now Thunder Bay) and attended St. Paul's College for his postsecondary studies from 1946 to 1949. There are many ways he gave his time to help our University community. Examples include serving as the Chair of our St. Paul's College Board of Governors from 1983 to 1988 and Chancellor of the University of Manitoba from 1992 to 2001.

The Mauro Institute is an incubator for research and activities relating to human rights and

JESUIT CENTRE FOR CATHOLIC STUDIES

The Jesuit Centre for Catholic Studies is a teaching and research centre operated out of St. Paul's College, with a B.A minor offered through the Faculty of Arts, University of Manitoba. It manages the largest Catholic Studies program in Canada and teaches over 400 students annually in a variety of courses designed to promote a scholarly understanding of the Catholic Church. It is staffed by two full-time professors and several sessional lecturers. Its faculty conducts research in fields related to the culture and history of Catholicism, the Society of Jesus, and contemporary religious issues. It prides itself on its student focus and its close connection to the community in Manitoba. The centre services students from 20 faculties, colleges or schools at the University of Manitoba. Catholic Studies graduates are currently pursuing careers in Law, Nursing, Medicine, Journalism, and Education, among other pursuits.

The 2023-24 academic year was a resounding success for the Jesuit Centre. Our classes remain at or near capacity, and our events continue to attract large crowds. This year, our Formations and Re-Formations in Catholic Thought lunch-hour lectures series included scholars from all over Canada addressing a great variety of topics from Indigenous language documents and Ignatian leadership to the Papal apology and Catholic Social Teaching. We also welcomed André Brouillette S.J. from Boston College to deliver our annual Jesuit Lecture on the topic of pilgrimage and the ongoing Synod on Synodality.

Our centre also helped organize and sponsor the Prairie Symposium for the Common Good, which was held in Saskatoon at St. Thomas More College, University of Saskatchewan, from April 29-May 1. We were proud to sponsor the symposium's Ayotte Family Lecture on Faith and the Environment, given this year by Sr. Dawn M. Nothwehr, OSF, the John Family Endowed Chair in Catholic Ethics at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago, III. USA.

We are particularly excited that spring 2024 marked the return of our beloved Travel Study course, which traveled to Ireland in late May. Dr. Meredith Bacola and Dr. Tim Penner led the trip, taking students all over Ireland to visit Catholic sites in Dublin, Galway and elsewhere. A full class of students participated in this unique and lifechanging experiential learning experience so central to our holistic approach to education.

All of the work of the Jesuit Centre – its teaching; its events; its research – are products of collaboration. Our alumni, our friends, our faculty, and, most importantly, our students are the beneficiaries of so many people's time and care. It is a great privilege to contribute to this work and we are all looking forward to the next academic vear.

NEAR EASTERN AND BIBLICAL ARCHAEOLOGY LABORATORY

Once again, it has been a very busy year in NEBAL. Tina began her visiting professorship at the University of Winnipeg in the Department of Anthropology and Haskel continued with his teaching cycle at the UofM.

During the Fall term, we welcomed a new MA student from China (Ms. Jiamin Wang) as well as several new undergraduate and graduate students into the lab. Each is working on parts of the collections curated in Near Eastern and Biblical Archaeology Laboratory (NEBAL).

Four graduate students are currently using materials in the lab for their theses. Annie Brown (PhD) continues to work on the Tell es-Safi/Gath microdebris (Israel); Mahyar KhademiBami (PhD) is working on the spatial organization of early cities in the Near East during the Early Bronze Age when cities first formed. Sarah Richardson (PhD) is currently in Iraq collecting data from a new excavation while writing up her results from Israel. Jiamin Wang (MA) is working on how mudbrick buildings are constructed in early urban societies and what that tells us about the organization of ancient societies.

One undergraduate, Julie (Xian) Chen, won an undergraduate research award from the Faculty of Arts to conduct research in the lab. She worked on butchered animal bone data from the archaeological site of Tel Afek in Israel to determine if they were butchered by metal or stone tools. Another NEBAL undergraduate, Tsun Hang (Boris) Leung, has also won an award from St. Paul's College – the Susan Deane International Paulinian Award.

A former undergraduate, Talia Shafai, worked on the fauna from the Late Bronze Age temple at Tell Beth Shemesh, Israel. She is now at the University of Cambridge for her MA doing cutting-edge archaeological sciences.

Haskel continues to analyze animal remains from various sites. This year, the emphasis is on Tell Beth Shemesh (Late Bronze Canaanite palace; Iron Age Israelite temple) and Tel al-Hammam (Middle Bronze Canaanite palace), which are stored in NEBAL. Beth Shemesh is where the ark of the covenant sat before being brought to Jerusalem by David and Solomon. Hammam is now being tested as one of the places for the famous biblical story of Sodom and Gomorrah.

Tina continues to analyze the animal bones from ancient Girsu in southern Mesopotamia. This site is one of the religious capital cities of the Sumerians during the Early Dynastic/Bronze Age. She just returned from a month of fieldwork at Girsu. She also spent 10 days working with colleagues and her graduate students at the University of Saskatchewan for both her Near Eastern projects and her joint SSHRC project with the shíshálh Nation on the North West Coast of British Columbia.

Tina is now in the planning stages to run an archaeological field school for the University of Winnipeg in Saskatchewan on residential schools. It will be teaching students about how to investigate different technologies to identify unmarked graves. Students from the University of Manitoba can register through the University of Winnipeg.

ACCOUNTING AND FINANCE REPORT

Having joined the St. Paul's College family just a few months ago (January 2024) I would like to thank my predecessor Ms. Leslie Finch for the care taken in ensuring the College remained fiscally responsible during her tenure as Comptroller. The finance team has the privilege of working closely with many individuals both within and outside the College. I have felt such a warm welcome and would like to thank you all.

In terms of an introduction – I have been with the university for 20 years primarily with Financial Services as well as several years with the Max Rady College of Medicine in finance and leadership roles. I am so pleased to be back at the Fort Garry campus and working in a unique position where we are responsible for both College and University finances.

St. Paul's College is entrusted with funding from various sources – donors mainly through the St. Paul's College Foundation Inc. as well as the University of Manitoba and the Archdiocese of Winnipeg; and revenue from various other sources. Our team has the important goals of ensuring the smooth operation of the College, issuing awards to students, and supporting the academic and spiritual goals of the College.

During 2022/23, we issued just over \$291,000 in student awards and managed the university budget of \$1.2 million to support the educational programs and administrative functions. The 2023/24 books have not been closed, but we have issued approximately \$360,000 in student awards in the most recent year.

I look forward to working collaboratively on many projects and in helping to further the impact of St. Paul's College for the years to come.
